PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

- Sarkis Antonian, resident, voiced his concerns regarding illegal drug use throughout the States and President Biden's visit to Monterey Park.
- Byron de Arakal, Consulting Director Entitlement Planning, TRC Retail, voiced his concerns regarding Raising Cane's on Atlantic Blvd and provided the City Council with documents supporting his concerns.
- Nancy Arcuri, resident, thanked City of Monterey Park for declaring March as Women's History month. She also asked on the status of the drought issue based on the amount of rain we received. She wished everyone a Happy St. Patrick's Day.
- Joseph Leon, San Gabriel Valley Mosquito Vector Control Board member, reported there are currently no West Nile virus cases in the community. He reminded the community with the recent amount of rain to be mindful of standing water, which mosquitoes like to breed in.
- Ed Chen, Athens Services, invited the community to the Compost Giveaway which will be held at Garvey Ranch Park on March 25, 2023, from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. He mentioned that there is a 30-gallon limit per household for the first hour, and the last two hours are unlimited while supplies last.
- Jennifer Tang, on behalf of Assembly Member Mike Fong, said they partnered with City of Monterey Park to host California Healthy Beautification Day at Garvey Ranch Park picnic shelter from 8:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, March 25, 2023. She congratulated the Mark Keppel Decathlon team and their coach Tim Tran.
- Jesse Chang, resident, voiced his idea on a community center to bring people together in ways that can be creative and generative.
- Johnny Phun, resident, expressed his support for a community center.
- Dr. Julie Phun, resident, shared the history and landmarks of Monterey Park that she remembered growing up. She voiced the idea of creating a community space for the public to share and celebrate diversity. She mentioned if this idea can be considered in their strategic planning as the city navigates away from January's tragedy.

- Library Services: City Librarian Garcia gave updates for the month of March. She shared information about an exhibit on the legal history of Chinese American Women called HERSTORY 2. She also mentioned a program featuring the Women's Leadership Panel in honor of Women's History month. She reminded the community of Drop-in Counseling, VITA Clinic, and the upcoming Novel-Tea fundraiser.
- Recreation and Community Services Department: Director of Recreation and Community Service Aguirre reminded the community of upcoming events: Shamrock Ball, Electric Park, Spring Egg Hunt, Cherry Blossom Festival, Earth Day, and Mardi Gras. He mentioned there will be a large banner at the Electric Park festival in several different languages saying, "United We Dance". He said based on the recent tragedy at the local dance studio, this banner is to remind everyone to not stop dancing and not to stop enjoying what they do.
- Public Works: Public Works Director Igoe shared upcoming events. He said the Free Compost event is in partnership with Athens Disposal and will be held on March 25th, 2023 from 9:00 am – 12:00 p.m. Bulky Item Spring Cleaning Event on April 8, 2023 from 8:00 am – 1:00 p.m. He reminded the community to be connected to the GoMPK app. He encouraged people to sign up for Nixle, an app that notifies residents with public safety matters.

As of February 28, 2023 invested funds for the City of Monterey Park is \$76,629,652.39.

3-C. CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO ADOPT A RESOLUTION TO RECORD A NOTICE OF NUISANCE ABATEMENT LIEN AGAINST CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY IN THE CITY (APN 5254-002-031)

Adopting the attached resolution will allow the City to recover costs, including attorney's fees, incurred the City's abatement of the public nuisance present on certain real property located in the City (Lot 1 of Tract No. 34875—APN 5254-002-031) (the "Property") owned by Center Int'l Investments, Inc. ("CII"). The Resolution authorizes recording the associated Notice of Nuisance Abatement Lien in the amount of \$2,012,197.41. This will be the fourth lien placed on the Property and covers expenses that the City incurred between October 1, 2022, and December 31, 2022. After recording this lien, the liens against the Property will total \$10,321,660.21.

CEQA (California Environmental Quality Act):

Adoption of the Resolution is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") under CEQA Guidelines § 15061(b)(3) because it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the action proposed by the proposed resolution would have a significant effect on the environment.

Action Taken: The City Council adopted Resolution No. 2023-R17 to record a Notice of Nuisance Abatement Lien on Consent Calendar.

3-D. REINSTATING WATER SHUTOFFS IN ACCORDANCE WITH SENATE BILL 998 AND MUNICIPAL CODE 14.12.240

By executive order issued on April 2, 2020, Governor Newsom prohibited local agencies from shutting off water to residential and certain commercial establishments for failure to pay potable water invoices. The City complied. Additionally, while not required by the Governor's order, the City also stopped applying late fee costs to delinquent accounts.

On June 3, 2020, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2175 which amended the MPMC to bring it into compliance with Health and Safety Code § 116900-116925 (added by Senate Bill 998). Among other things, Ordinance No. 2175 amended MPMC §14.12.240 which requires the City to wait at least 60 days before terminating water Service. Additionally, MPMC § 14.12.340 requires the City to notify low-income households with delinquent accounts regarding financial assistance programs that may assist in paying outstanding balances. All final shutoff notices must be in writing and affixed (usually with a door hanger) to the door of the property with a water account.

While the Governor's order expired September 30, 2021, and the local emergency terminated in April 2022, the City has nevertheless extended the shutoff moratorium described above. Based upon the Governor's proclamation terminating the statewide emergency on February 28, 2023, the City is now ready to resume shutoffs and collections in accordance with the MPMC.

Action Taken: The City Council received and filed this report and notified the City Council and public that the City will resume water shut-offs and late fees pursuant to Monterey Park Municipal Code § 14.12.240.

3-E. AUTHORIZE THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE A LICENSE AGREEMENT WITH CHINATOWN SERVICE CENTER TO UTILIZE SPACE WITHIN THE BRUGGEMEYER LIBRARY TO PROVIDE MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS SERVICES

Beginning in January 2023, Chinatown Service Center has provided multilingual counselors and caseworkers in the Monterey Park Bruggemeyer Library to support the mental health and wellness of community members following the January 21 mass shooting. This partnership serves an ongoing need of the City which is expected to continue for the next several months or longer.

The City would like to execute a license agreement with Chinatown Service Center to document the usage of the space. As part of the license agreement, the City will continue to provide space for Chinatown Service Center to table and to provide on-site counseling. Chinatown Service Center will continue to be responsible for maintaining active status and good standing as a non-profit organization and ensuring the area stays clean and in usable condition.

Staff is recommending City Council authorize the City Manager, or designee, to execute a license agreement, in a form approved by the City Attorney to use designated space within the Library to provide outreach services.

Action Taken: The City Council authorized the City Manager, or designee to execute a license agreement in a form approved by the City Attorney with Chinatown Service Center to utilize space within the Bruggemeyer Library to provide mental health and wellness services to the community on Consent Calendar.

3-F. CALIFORNIA STATE LIBRARY 2023-2024 LIBRARY SERVICES TECHNOLOGY ACT (LSTA) LOCAL AND COLLABORATIVE GRANT

The California State Library's LSTA Local and Collaborative Grant is an opportunity that provides competitive grants of up to \$100,000 to local libraries to strengthen the ability of California libraries to design equitable programs and services in collaboration with their local communities.

If adopted, the proposed resolution would authorize the City Manager, or designee, to apply for the Local and Collaborative Grant and to implement a budget amendment if the City is awarded funds. The deadline to apply is March 28, 2023, funds will be awarded in the summer of 2023 and the project completion date is June 30, 2024.

Action Taken: The City Council adopted Resolution No. 2023-R18 authorized the City Manager, or designee, to apply for, receive, and appropriate grant funds for the California State Library's 2023-2024 LSTA Local and Collaborative Grant on Consent Calendar.

3-G. AUTHORIZE THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE LICENSE AGREEMENTS WITH YOUTH ATHLETIC ORGANIZATIONS FOR THEIR USAGE OF DESIGNATED STORAGE UNITS AND SNACK BARS IN CITY PARKS

The City of Monterey Park has a long history of providing the community with access to a variety of youth sports with the assistance of local non-profit organizations. These local non-profit organizations utilize City facilities to manage sports leagues, clinics and competitions focused on the development of young athletes. The City would like to continue working with the athletic organizations to provide recreational and competitive sports opportunities. To manage each of these sports the organizations store maintenance and athletic equipment that is housed in storage units located at each park for easy and consistent access. Some of the organizations also utilize designated snack bars to help raise funding to support their non-profit.

The City will continue to provide dedicated spaces for the storage units to be housed and maintain the area around each unit and provide access to designated snack bars for permitted use. Each organization will continue to be responsible for securely storing their equipment; maintaining active status and in good standing as a non-profit organization; and ensuring the site stays clean and in usable

condition. The City is not responsible for the storage unit or its contents. Organizations operating a snack bar will be responsible for and in compliance with all County of Los Angeles Public Health Department's health and safety standards. Even though these organizations have been active for many years and have stored equipment in City parks, the City would like to establish a license agreement with each organization to document the usage of the spaces.

Staff is recommending City Council authorize the City Manager, or designee, to execute license agreements, in a form approved by the City Attorney to use designated storage units and snack bars in City parks.

Action Taken: The City Council authorized the City Manager, or designee, to execute license agreements, in a form approved by the City Attorney with the MPK Baseball and Softball Inc, and SoCal Elite Soccer Club to utilize designated storage units and snack bars in City Parks on Consent Calendar.

3-H. FY 2022-23 SIDEWALK REPAIR PROJECT (SPEC NO. 2022-011)

Staff prepared a bid specification for the 2022-23 Sidewalk Repair project and requests the City Council's authorization to add the proposed project to the City's FY 22-23 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). A budget appropriation of \$52,182 from Prop A Funds, \$174,946 from TDA 3 Fund, and \$122,671 from Gas Tax Fund to the FY 22-23 Budget is requested to proceed with this project. This project will repair existing concrete infrastructure throughout the City.

CEQA (California Environmental Quality Act)

The proposed project is categorically exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to 14 California Code of Regulations § 15301 as a Class 1 categorical exemption (Existing Facilities). The Project results in minor alterations to existing public facilities involving no significant expansion of the existing use. The Project is not anticipated to have any significant impacts regarding traffic, noise, air quality or water quality.

Action Taken: The City Council adopted Resolution No. 2023-R19 to add the FY 2022-23 Sidewalk Repair to the Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP"), and appropriated \$52,182 from Prop A Funds, \$174,946 from TDA 3 Fund, and \$122,672 from Gas Tax Fund to the FY 22-23 Budget to proceed with this project,

A RESOLUTION AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 2022-R32 TO ADD THE 2022-23 SIDEWALK REPAIR PROJECT AS PROJECT NO. 96039 TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN ("CIP") AND FINDING SUCH AMENDMENT CONFORMS WITH THE GENERAL PLAN

3-I. RECEIVE AND FILE STAFF REPORT SUMMARIZING THE STATUS OF EMERGENCY REPAIRS OF THE MONTEREY PASS ROAD WATER LINE

On August 17, 2022, City Council adopted Resolution No. 2022-R69 authorizing the City Manager to take necessary measures for emergency repair of a water main line on Monterey Pass Road. Recurring water main leaks in several areas within Monterey Pass Road between the intersections of Vagabond Drive and Brightwood street resulted in extensive infrastructure damage to the roadway and necessary water main pipe repairs to ensure continued water service to residences and businesses in the area.

Action Taken: The City Council received and filed the staff report that summarized the status of emergency repairs of the Monterey Park Pass Road water line on Consent Calendar.

3-J. TASK ORDER TO RKA CONSULTANTS FOR PUBLIC WORKS INSPECTION SERVICES

On January 19, 2022, City Council approved Agreement No. 2283-A with RKA Consulting Group for on-call Engineering Services. Staff requests approval to execute a Task Order to this Agreement for public works inspection services, not to exceed \$218,000 annually.

Action Taken: The City Council authorized the City Manager to execute a Task Order, per Agreement 2283-A with RKA Consulting Group for Public Works inspections services, in a form approved by the City Attorney, not to exceed \$218,000 annually on Consent Calendar.

4. PUBLIC HEARING

4-A. ANNUAL WEED ABATEMENT PROTEST HEARING

The County of Los Angeles Department of Agriculture Commissioner and Weights and Measures submitted to the City the annual Weed Abatement Declaration List and resolution declaring that weeds, brush, rubbish, refuse, and dirt maintained on certain private properties in the City, are a public nuisance. At the regular City Council meeting on March 1, 2023, the Council adopted Resolution No. 2023-R14 approving the 2023 Weed Abatement Declaration List as posted by the County. By adopting the Resolution, the Council declared its intention to provide for the

abatement of said public nuisances. To complete the process, the Council must hold a protest hearing to allow parcel owners identified on the Declaration List an opportunity to object to their inclusion thereon.

CEQA (California Environmental Quality Act) Discussion:

Adoption of the Resolution is exempt for the California Environmental Quality Act (“CEQA”) under CEQA Guidelines § 15061(b) (3), because it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the Resolution may have a significant effect on the environment.

Action Taken: Mayor Pro Tem Wong did not participate on Agenda Item No. 4A due to potential conflict of interest and left the dais as his employer, Southern California Edison has properties listed on the weed abatement declaration list. The City Council opened the public hearing at 8:23 p.m. to receive testimonial and documentary evidence; and closed the public hearing at 8:24 p.m. with no registered speakers; and adopted Resolution No. 2023-R20 with the Declaration List.

6. **CITY COMMUNICATIONS (CITY COUNCIL)**

Councilmember Lo thanked the Police Department and city staff for their preparation of President Biden’s visit to Monterey Park on Tuesday, March 14, 2023, to address gun violence. He also shared that he was invited to speak at the National Asian American Pacific Islander Chamber of Commerce Entrepreneurship Round Table held at the San Gabriel Hilton. He said he had the opportunity to attend the Southern California Swearing-in ceremony for Attorney General Rob Bonta.

Councilmember Yiu said she greatly appreciated President Biden's visit and that it was a great honor to be able to meet and talk with him in person.

Councilmember Ngo acknowledged the Fire and Police for organizing the Presidential visit. He mentioned his tour with the Police and Fire Department to see what goes on behind the scenes and thanked both chiefs for the visit.

Mayor Pro Tem Wong said he also toured the Fire and Police Department. He thanked the chiefs for their guidance and the issues and concerns within the community. He said he looks forward to future tours with other departments and briefings. He mentioned that he attended the League of California Cities Division dinner on March 2, 2023, in Downtown Los Angeles. He reported they talked about upcoming measures and addressed homelessness and housing in Los Angeles. He mentioned he attended State Attorney General Rob Bonta's Swearing-in ceremony in Los Angeles Little Tokyo. He talked about his attendance to President Biden's visit to help the community heal and bring them together on additional gun violence prevention measures at a federal level. He appreciates all City departments for making that visit happen smoothly. He spoke on the State Grant Application for the Library Book Mobile and suggested the library reach out to our Legislators for support. He spoke on the last council meeting's resolution on gun control regulations and asked if a letter of support could be drafted and sent to the Senate Appropriation Committee.

Mayor Sanchez echoed Mayor Pro Tem Wong's last statement regarding a support letter of gun control regulations and added two other bills for consideration. He said the first bill is CA AB28, gun violence prevention act. He reported it would create an excess tax on the revenue being made from gun sales and ammunition and the money would be used for gun prevention programs in the state. He said the second bill is SB2, public carry law, in response to Supreme Court's Bruen ruling. He also expressed his appreciation towards the city staff on the effort made behind the scenes to create President Biden's visit. He also mentioned on March 10, 2023, he joined City Treasurer Lee to talk about public service to the Cub Scouts. He also thanked Police Chief Wiese and Fire Chief Hallock for the tours of the Police and Fire Departments. He said he was invited by Moms Demand Action, a nationwide gun violence prevention group to the State Capital last weekend.
