

Monterey Park is Responding to the 20% Water Conservation Challenge

Residents and businesses should continue to conserve to achieve the 20% savings goal in February 2016

The City of Monterey Park's conservation efforts are paying off and the progress is trending favorably. If all of the residents and businesses continue to do their part in conserving water and avoid water wasteful behavior, the city is anticipated to exceed the 20% water conservation mandate in September through the remainder of the year. We all must continue to focus on our water usage patterns and continue to work together to help our city meet or exceed this goal.

Monterey Park is required to reduce water consumption by 20% and is required to report on conservation progress to the State of California Water Resources Board. In an effort to reach this 20% goal, the Monterey Park City Council has declared a Stage 2 Drought which is described below. In addition, city staff monitors, tracks and reports the production of water on a daily basis. The progress is calculated and reported weekly in a series of graphs. It is important to remember the city is responsible to reduce the cumulative total of water used from June 2015 to February 2016. The graphs illustrate the city's progress in achieving the conservation goal and updated versions can be found on the city's website.

The city decided to not establish individual allocations for residents and businesses and penalize those exceeding their allocation. Many other water agencies

have adopted this approach in an effort to meet their goal. Instead, the City of Monterey Park has reduced its consumption at city facilities and is confident the residents and business owners will continue to do their part to collectively meet our conservation goal. Currently, the city's conservation results continue to trend up showing improvement and overall effectiveness. This very promising fact creates optimism and confidence that we will be able to achieve our conservation goal. However, in the event individuals demonstrate water wasting behavior, the city is prepared to issue warnings and fines up to \$500 if necessary to deter such behavior.

The Stage 2 Drought Emergency Plan implements the following:


- Bans watering public street medians and all watering between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.
- Limits all watering to two days per week Mondays and Thursdays only.
- Adopts a 20-percent water conservation goal citywide that aligns with mandated reductions set by the State.
- Reinforces that violators face fines up to \$500 per incident.

The council action also included the following water-use restrictions:

- No turf irrigation within 48-hours following a measurable rain.
- No washing paved surfaces using potable water except as required for public health.

- No water service to multiple parcels separately owned through one common service
- No irrigating in such a manner to create runoff from the property.
- All leaks are required to be repaired as soon as reasonably possible.
- No washing vehicles unless; at a commercial carwash, using reclaimed water, or using a handheld bucket or water hose equipped with automatic shutoff nozzle.
- No running hoses at any time.
- No drinking water provided to customers by hotels, restaurants, or businesses unless requested.
- Optional laundering of linens by commercial lodging establishments must be offered to guests and must prominently display notice in each room.
- No water used to clean, fill or maintain water levels in a decorative fountain, pond or water feature unless such water flows through a recycling system.
- No non re-circulating water systems allowed to be installed at new commercial car washes and Laundromat facilities.
- No non single pass cooling systems allowed to be installed in commercial buildings.

MPK Fire Department Ambulance Membership Open Enrollment

One ambulance call can cost you \$1,750. Help protect you and your family or your business from the sudden expense of ambulance service



Does your health insurance cover 9-1-1 emergency ambulance transport calls or non-transport patient assessment calls? Perhaps your health insurance doesn't cover 100% of those medical costs. You can save these out of pocket expenses by joining the Paramedic Ambulance Membership Program at a reasonable cost of \$50 per year.

The average cost of an ambulance bill is \$1,750. The cost can be higher based on the medication, tools, and equipment used. A non-transport or patient assessment call is not covered by some health insurance plans and costs an average of \$254 and higher.

The Monterey Park Fire Department's Paramedic Ambulance Membership Program covers these costs. The program runs from October 1 to September 30 and covers you and your family members who regularly live in your home. You can sign up for membership and pay on an annual basis or you can choose to make installment payments of \$8.33 every two months when placed on your City of Monterey Park water/trash bill.

Monterey Park businesses can also sign up for this service to cover the

employer and employees. For Monterey Park businesses located in-town, the cost is \$50 per 10 employees with the maximum rate set at \$750 per year for 141 employees or more. The Business Paramedic Ambulance Membership program year operates July 1 through June 30 and covers all employees working in the business' normal operating hours.

To become a member, fill out a simple application and return it with your payment to the City of Monterey Park or mark "Easy Pay" to pay on your water/trash bill.

Avoid Being an Auto Theft Victim

While some studies show a decrease in violent crime in California, property crime statistics are going up. In particular, the San Gabriel Valley is seeing a marked increase in vehicle thefts. A recent study by the Public Policy Institute of California found a “noticeable rise in motor vehicle thefts” of 17% due to prison realignment and prisoner release in this state. Monterey Park Police Department would like to remind everyone that there are several things that we can do to avoid being a victim.

Many auto thefts are crimes of opportunity meaning that the car thief may not have planned to steal a car until that moment when an opportunity presented itself that made it easy. People leave their vehicle engine running to “warm it up” while they run back in the house for something. They feel safe in doing so because the vehicle is parked in their own driveway or right in front of their home. But you just never know who is going to be walking by at that moment. Leaving a vehicle unattended with the ignition running makes it an easy target and one that most criminals cannot resist. And never leave a spare key in your car. If your car is burglarized chances are the suspect will find that key and take your car!

Whenever possible, park your vehicle inside your garage. If you don't have that luxury, park it in your driveway or directly in front of your home and add motion sensor lights to the exterior of your home. Always activate your car alarm, and use a steering wheel locking device such as “The Club” or a gas pedal lock. If you live

in an apartment complex check to make sure there are working exterior lights illuminating the parking area. If there aren't, speak to the property manager or owner. These are simple and inexpensive solutions that can save the investment you've made in purchasing your car. Anything that might draw attention to or slow down the bad guy is usually enough to send him down the block.

Remember too that thieves are rarely involved in just one type of crime. More often than not they are involved in many other types of criminal activity including identity theft. So avoid leaving mail, bills, and personal documents in your vehicle, particularly those that contain personal identifying information such as birth dates, social security numbers, bank account information, etc. Once stolen, these items are used to commit identity theft and are often sold or traded amongst criminals.

Never leave anything of value in plain view inside your vehicle. Even the least valuable item such as a phone charger or loose change is enough to catch the eye of a crook. Once inside your car, crooks will find everything else you think you've hidden in the glove box, center console and under your seat.



Dispose of Your Used Furniture and Appliances the Right Way

Call Athens Services for free curbside pickup for most items on your regular trash day



Before leaving used furniture or appliances at the curb, contact Athens Services to schedule a "bulky item" pick-up. There is no cost but residents must call Athens at least 24 hours in advance of their scheduled trash collection day. It is the resident's responsibility to make sure that all items are removed. Any items left at the curb for more than 24 hours can result in citation and fines. Residents are encouraged to

donate their used furniture and appliances to charitable organizations such as Good Will and Salvation Army. These donated items can be claimed as tax deductions at the end of the year.

Electronic waste such as television monitors, computers, stereos, and video recorders/players can also be donated to charitable organizations but will not be eligible for Athens' curbside pickup. Electronic waste is considered hazardous and cannot be placed at the curbside. These items must be disposed of properly at designated facilities.

Following these guidelines will help keep the city's streets clean and safe!

July 21 – 24, 2015, Monterey Park hosted 197 delegates representing Special Olympics Germany in partnership and participation with Special Olympics World Games Los Angeles 2015. Throughout the course of three days, the athletes, coaches and staff enjoyed a multitude of cultural experiences provided by Monterey Park, Alhambra, and Lincoln Heights.

Over 150 volunteers of Monterey Park residents and other San Gabriel Valley representatives came together to create an unforgettable experience that culminated at Barnes Park on July 23, 2015 for the Color. Art. Movement Festival. With a motorcade escort from Monterey Park Police Department the delegates were safely transported throughout their stay with Host Town Monterey Park. The festival featured Taiko, Hula,

arts & crafts, live bands, local eats, a photo booth, medical services from Monterey Park Fire Department, and most of all a great display of hospitality towards the honored guests. Delegates and residents gathered together to create international bonds and further the goals of acceptance and inclusion.

The World Games Los Angeles 2015 opening ceremony was on July 25, 2015 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. 6,500 athletes and 2,000 coaches from 165 countries were celebrated with loud fanfare and excitement from 100,000+ visitors. Olympians, celebrities, dignitaries, and heads of state as well as the First Lady of the United States Michelle Obama, gathered together to cheer on the super stars of the Special Olympics World Games. For eight days following the festivities

at opening ceremonies, the games spanned across Los Angeles county at seven different venues for fields of play with a total spectator count of 500,000 and 30,000 volunteers.





Council Action Review

Regular Meeting of June 17, 2015

The meeting was called to order at 7:07 p.m., with all members present.

There were no additions, deletions, changes or adoptions.

Presentations: None.

BY CONSENSUS COUNCIL AGREED TO LOOK INTO ADDRESSING ISSUES THAT WERE RAISED REGARDING THE SPIRIT BUS CONTRACT. POSSIBLY BRINGING BACK FOR COUNCIL REVIEW EITHER ON JULY 1, 2015 REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING OR AT THE SPECIAL PRESENTATION MEETING ON JUNE 23, 2015.

A Guide to the Night Sky

Hard to believe that it's September already. It was only back in the beginning of July when both Venus and Jupiter put on a magnificent show in the western sky just after sunset. Now if you look to the west after sunset, they are no longer there - they've wandered into the glare of the sun.

September brings with it several indications that our planet is orbiting our own star, The Sun, which, of course, brings us the seasons. Speaking of which, the Autumnal Equinox happens this month on Wednesday, September 23, somewhere between 1:16 and 1:22 a.m. (my sources really need to pull it together). This is a very interesting event, astronomically speaking. On the Equinoxes, the sun rises due east and sets due west, meaning both hemispheres - the northern and southern - receive the same amount of daylight, as well as the same amount of night (the term Equinox is Latin for "equal night"). Now, we all are familiar with the days getting shorter as summer ends, but have you ever stopped to think about why this happens?


It's all due to the Earth being tilted about 24 degrees. As Earth orbits our star, there are times when the top half of Earth (the northern hemisphere) is tilted towards the sun (summer) and times when it's leaning away from the sun (winter). We can see this with our own eyes. In summer, the sun is high in the sky, our shadows are short and it's warmer outside. In winter, the sun is a lot lower in the sky, our shadows are longer and it's colder outside. Fun Fact: Earth's orbit is an ellipse - our planet is actually closer to the sun in winter, and farther away from the sun in summer.

Subsequently, there are times, as Earth orbits the sun, when neither hemispheres are tilted toward nor away from the sun - these are the Equinoxes. If you Google "equinoxes" you'll find some great animations that explain this.

But what about the planets? Well, kind of slow this month, compared to July, unless you a) are an early riser and b) have an unobstructed view of the eastern horizon at dawn. But first, Saturn. Saturn is still hanging in there. Early in the month you will find Saturn in the SSW sky after sunset. Remember, it may be the second largest planet in our solar system, but it's so far away, that unlike Venus and Jupiter, it only appears as a moderately bright star. Actually, on the night of the 18th, you can find Saturn just to the left of the crescent moon in the SW, as the pair travel the night sky together - although, it's a short distance to the western horizon from where they both are at sunset... they will both set around 10:30-ish.

Early in the month on September 2, Mars and Venus will be just above the eastern horizon around 5:30 a.m. Mars will be the steady, glowing pinkish object considerably left of brilliant Venus. However, at month's end, Venus, Mars and Jupiter will all appear in an almost straight line above the eastern horizon around 5:45 .am., with Mars sandwiched between the two brightest planets, Venus above Mars and Jupiter below.

The Los Angeles Astronomical Society (LAAS) meets at Monterey Park's Garvey Ranch Observatory every Wednesday night, rain or shine, from 7-10 p.m. All members are eager to answer your questions and let you have a peek through our 8" telescope, weather permitting. 

In the Alhambra Unified School District, the phrase, "We all have a hand in every child's success" has become the Division of Student/Employee Welfare's new mantra. One will hear this mantra through the halls of the Alhambra Unified School District, and see it in action, as teachers, parents, support staff, agency partners, and district administration work collaboratively to maximize student and parent engagement, student achievement, and school climate.

The Alhambra Unified School District is working hard to build its newest division, the Student/Employee Welfare (SEW) Division, with a number of new and innovative projects. Together administrators and school counselors are restructuring the Department of School Counseling on each campus to address the academic, social emotional, career and vocational pathways for each student. The new program also includes a level of support for each student and their family from the school's Intervention Adviser. The Student Services Office has been decommissioned as well and rebadged as the Student/Employee Welfare Office, addressing the needs of students and the employees that support the students of AUSD.

In order to accurately and effectively assist all students, the SEW division will service both elementary and high school sites with a two Coordinators of Student and Employee Welfare, one coordinator that targets the elementary needs and another coordinator that addresses the needs of the high school student. By expanding the division in this way, students at every school site will receive more individualized support in the areas of attendance, citizenship and academics by a coordinator assigned to their specific grade level.

An Intervention Advisor will be assigned to each elementary school site five days a week, for a total of 25 hours. The role of the Intervention Adviser is to support students and their families by coming alongside the administration, faculty and staff. They are familiar with facilitating Evidence Based Classroom Lessons/Practices, Group Counseling, The 6 Year Plan, and workshops for parents. One of their most important roles is to monitor and review student attendance. They will work with families to welcome students back to school life and engage students in their academic responsibilities. By reducing chronic absenteeism in this way at the elementary level, students stay in school and graduate from high school with a diploma.

AUSD's commitment to providing school based mental health services in clearly outlined in the district's LCAP. The implementation services provided by the Intervention Advisors at the elementary level, the Gateway To Success Counselors, and Coordinators of Student Employee Welfare are a part of this commitment to address school climate, student and parent engagement, and school attendance. Juan Fajardo Gateway Student of the Year - Around Alhambra

Juan Fajardo is the first from his family to complete the coursework for the high school diploma and graduate from high school. He graduated from San Gabriel High School in the Matador Stadium on May 29, 2015 as a member of the Class of 2015. His pathway to the completion of his K-12 education is one filled with opportunity, self-reflection, perseverance and determination.

Fajardo started his high school trajectory as a freshman at San Gabriel High School. He met enthusiastic students and teachers who welcomed his freshman class and was inducted into the school's MOMA - Motivating Matadors Program, a transition program for all ninth grade students. Efforts were made on the part of the school to provide opportunities for involvement for Fajardo and his peers. Upper classmen came alongside him to speak with him about joining the athletic program and a number of different clubs. And both Teachers and administrators at school would take those minutes before and after class to encourage the young freshman to focus and concentrate.

But for Fajardo, there would be some unforeseeable challenges that he would face, challenges that would present themselves throughout his high school years. The challenges were real for Fajardo and caused him to miss school. The challenges would cause him and his peers to choose negative outcomes that distracted him from the academic demands

of school life. The challenges manifested themselves as academic, attitude and attendance failure. Failure became a part of Fajardo's high school journey.

Failure, however, caused others, both at home and school, to notice that young Fajardo was in need of support and struggling. His family would make time to work with the Gateway to Success Program staff to find services to help him develop a skill to handle the challenges he faced, to take time to reflect before making the decision to act. The school provided several levels of intervention that resulted in Fajardo's academic success. Others would come into Fajardo's life to mentor him and teach him how to handle challenges and failure so he could persevere through the most difficult of times.

As Fajardo's high school journey concluded, he developed into a young man, a productive member of our community. He became determined to achieve his goals and experienced school life in a positive way. He passed class after class. And soon he earned the minimum of 210 credits towards graduation. He trusted the adults around him and reached out to those who came alongside him to help. Although, Juan's journey seemed daunting at times, he left his school as a graduate with post-secondary plans and high school diploma in hand.

At the Alhambra Unified School District Board of Education Meeting on June 2, 2015 in front of the Fajardo family and Friends, Teachers, Administrators, Support Staff, and the Superintendent's Cabinet, Juan was presented the Gateway to Success Student of the Year Award (2015). The recipient of this distinguished award is a graduate from the Alhambra Unified School District who demonstrates excellent effort in academic endeavors, perseverance in achieving school goals and a positive student attitude.

MKHS Theater Group Invited to Perform in Scotland

The Mark Keppel High School (MKHS) Theater Company was invited by The Fringe Festival to perform their spring musical, Peter Pan, in Edinburgh, Scotland in summer of 2015. Many outstanding American high schools are nominated and only the top high schools are selected each year to perform as part of the largest arts festival in Scotland. Over two hundred high schools were nominated this year and MKHS was one of forty-two selected to perform. Each year, the Fringe Festival transforms Edinburgh for three weeks into a host city for international high school performers to experience local and regional attractions and venues balanced with a rigorous program of workshops, rehearsals, and performances. After a year of fundraising, the MKHS Theater Company was able to raise over \$70,000 for their trip. 

- 2) Contact Lenses** – Cleaning or moistening your contact lenses by putting them in your mouth is not a good idea, because bacteria in the mouth can cause conjunctivitis.
- 3) Pencils, pens or pipes** – Chewing on these items can cause both the wearing down of the teeth and invisible cracks or fissures to form in the enamel of the teeth. Under certain circumstances, these cracks or fissures can make it more likely for your teeth to crack or chip. TNJ (jaw joint) problems can be aggravated by chewing on foreign objects.
- 4) Tongue studs and lip or cheek rings** – Puncture of the tongue can lead to excessive bleeding or infection, such as hepatitis. It's amazing how many people with tongue studs or lip rings tell their dentists they hate Novocain shots.
- 5) Hot food followed by cold** – Hot coffee or drinks followed immediately by an icy drink or ice cream can lead to cracks in your teeth. Dental enamel is highly mineralized and hard, when it is exposed to extremes in temperatures, tiny cracks may form on your teeth.
- 6) Metal nails** – Holding nails in your mouth may be convenient, but a slip or fall can cause nails to puncture the lip or mouth.
- 7) Small (onilateral) partial dentures** – Partial dentures or removable bridges that are not attachable to both sides of the mouth are small enough to be swallowed during sleep and can cause choking.
- 8) Aspirin on the gum** – Because aspirin is so acidic, leaving an aspirin on your gum to relieve pain can end up leaving you in more discomfort. Aspirin can denude the surface of the gum and leave it extremely raw and sore.
- 9) Super glue to glue back a loose crown** – Gluing back a loose crown with super glue or any other commercial glue may seem like a good self-help idea. But the strong chemicals in these glues can cause terrific toothaches and result in the entire tooth being dissolved by the glue in a very short time.
- 10) Ice, seeds, jawbreakers, etc.** – Chewing on hard items like these can fracture your teeth, especially if you already have large fillings in your teeth. Incidentally, restaurants and markets are generally fair about reimbursing you for the cost of restoring a tooth that broke from biting into a foreign object in your food. In either case, you must report it immediately to the restaurant or store manager. Then see your dentist as soon as possible. If it happened from food purchased at a market, you must show the manager the food item, the receipt, the foreign object and tooth fragments, if any. Then see your dentist for a brief report stating the cause and estimated cost for treatment.



蒙特利公園市對節省20%用水挑戰作出響應

居民和商家業主應繼續節省用水，在2016年2月完成節省20%用水的目標

蒙特利公園市在節省用水方面的努力得到了回報，而且進展趨勢順利。如果所有居民和商家業主繼續在節省用水方面做好他們的工作，避免浪費用水行為，蒙市預計可在今年九月以及剩餘時間裡，完成超越節省20%用水的任務。我們全部的人都必須繼續專注於我們的用水使用模式，並繼續共同努力，一起協助蒙市達成或超越目標。

蒙市需要做到節省20%的用水要求，也需要向加州水資源委員會報告用水進展。為了達到節省20%用水目標，蒙特利公園市市議會已經宣佈下文所述的2級乾旱應急措施。此外，市府工作人員會在日常生活中進行監督，追蹤和報告用水量。每週用一系列圖表計算和報告進展。請記住，從2015年6月開始至2016年2月，蒙市有責任減低市內的總用水量，這是非常重要的事。圖表說明蒙市在節省用水目標方面的進展，同時，您也可以蒙市市府網站上找到最新版本。

蒙市決定不為居民和商家業主設立個人分配量，也不懲罰那些超出他們分配量的個人和企業。因為許多其他用水機構已經在採取這種方法來達成他們的目標。相反地，蒙特利公園市已減少在城市設施方面的用水，也對居民和商家業主們充滿信心，相信他們將會繼續做好他們的部分，共同完成我們節省用水的目標。目前，蒙市的用水結果和整體改善效果顯示良好。這個最佳事實為我們帶來了希望，也將對我們實現節省用水量目標帶來了信心。然而，對於個人浪費用水行為的個案，如有必要，蒙市準備發出警告以及作出金額高達\$500元的罰款來制止這種行為。

2級乾旱應急計劃實行措施如下：

- 禁止用水沖洗公共街道及馬路中央地帶。早上9點至下午5點期間，禁止用水灌溉草坪和植物。
- 戶外灌溉限制為每週兩天 — 只能在每週的週一和週四，對草坪和植物進行澆水。
- 市內制定的節省20%用水目標，符合由加州州政府規定的減少用水命令。
- 加強對違法者的處罰，對每個個案處罰金額增加至\$500元。

市議會行動還包括下列用水限制：

- 在下過可量計雨量的雨水過後的48小時內，不可對草坪進行灌溉。
- 除非是公共健康所需，否則不得使用飲用水清洗瀝青路面。
- 不能使用同一個供水水表，向多片由個人各自擁有的土地供水。
- 灌溉不能造成用水從所在物業地面上流失。
- 所有漏水都必須在合理的情況下盡快修復。
- 除了商業洗車店鋪可以使用可索償用水，或使用桶或帶有自動關閉閘門的水管設備外，禁止用水洗刷車子，小船，拖車，或其它移動式設備。
- 任何時間都不能開著一直流水的水龍頭。
- 若非客人要求，禁止酒店，餐館或商家提供飲用水服務。
- 商業旅舍必須向顧客提供可換洗床單的選擇，而且必須在每個房間的顯眼之處展示通告。
- 除非水流量低於循環使用系統水平，禁止用水來清理，填滿或維護噴泉或池塘的裝飾高度。
- 不允許在新的商業洗車店鋪和自助洗衣店鋪內，安裝非循環使用用水系統。
- 不允許在商業樓宇裡安裝非單通道冷卻系統。

Monterey Park está respondiendo al Desafío del 20% de Conservación de Agua

Los residentes y las empresas deben de continuar conservando para alcanzar la meta del 20% de ahorro en Febrero del 2016.

Los esfuerzos de conservación de la Ciudad de Monterey Park están dando sus frutos y el progreso tiene una tendencia favorable. Si todos los residentes y negocios continúan haciendo su parte en conservar agua y en evitar el comportamiento derrochador de agua, se prevé que la ciudad excederá el mandato del 20% de conservación de agua en Septiembre a través del resto del año. Todos debemos concentrarnos en nuestras normas del uso del agua y continuar trabajando juntos para ayudar a nuestra ciudad a cumplir o a sobrepasar esta meta.

Monterey Park es requerida a reducir el consumo de agua un 20% y está obligada a informar sobre el progreso de la conservación a la Junta de Recursos del Agua del Estado de California. En un esfuerzo para alcanzar esta meta del 20%, el Consejo Municipal de la Ciudad de Monterey Park ha declarado una sequía en Etapa 2, que se describe a continuación. Además, los monitores del personal municipal, controlan e informan sobre la producción de agua diariamente. El progreso es calculado y reportado semanalmente en una serie de gráficos. Es importante recordar que la ciudad es responsable de reducir el total acumulado de agua utilizada desde Junio del 2015 hasta Febrero del 2016. Los gráficos ilustran el progreso de la ciudad en lograr la meta de conservación y versiones actualizadas se pueden encontrar en la red de la ciudad.

La ciudad decidió no establecer asignaciones individuales para los residentes y negocios ni penalizar a los que sobrepasan su asignación. Muchas otras agencias del agua han adoptado este enfoque en un esfuerzo por cumplir con su objetivo. En su lugar, la Ciudad de Monterey Park ha reducido el consumo de agua en sus instalaciones y confía que los residentes y dueños de empresas continuarán haciendo su parte para satisfacer colectivamente nuestra meta de conservación. Actualmente, los resultados de conservación de la ciudad continúan subiendo y mostrando mejoras y multas de hasta \$500, si es necesario, para impedir tal comportamiento.

El Plan de Emergencia de Sequía en Etapa 2 implementa lo siguiente:

- Prohíbe regar los jardines del centro de las calles públicas y regar entre las 9:00 a.m. y 5:00 p.m.
- Limita toda irrigación a dos días por semana – Sólo los lunes y jueves.
- Adopta una meta de 20 por ciento de conservación de agua en toda la ciudad que se alinea con reducciones obligatorias establecidas por el Estado.
- Refuerza que los violadores enfrenten multas de hasta \$500 por incidente.

La acción del Consejo también incluye las siguientes restricciones sobre el uso del agua:

- No regar el césped dentro de las 48 horas después de una lluvia mensurable.
 - No lavar superficies pavimentadas utilizando agua potable excepto si es requerido para la salud pública.
 - No habrá servicio de agua para múltiples parcelas con distintos dueños a través de un servicio común.
 - No regar de tal manera que cause derrame de agua desde la propiedad.
 - Es requerido que todas fugas de agua sean reparadas tan pronto como sea razonablemente posible.
 - No lavar vehículos, a menos que sea: en un lavado de autos comercial, usando agua regenerada, o utilizando un balde o manguera de agua equipada con boquilla de cierre automático.
 - No se servirá agua para beber a los clientes en los hoteles, restaurantes, o negocios a menos que sea solicitada.
 - Lavado de ropa de cama opcional en los establecimientos de hospedaje comercial debe de ser ofrecido a los huéspedes y un aviso se debe exhibir prominentemente en cada habitación.
 - No se debe utilizar agua para limpiar, llenar o mantener los niveles de agua en una fuente decorativa, estanque o elemento acuático a menos que esa agua fluya a través de un sistema de reciclaje.
 - No es permitido que sistemas que no-recirculan el agua sean instalados en nuevas facilidades comerciales de lavado de autos o lavanderías.
 - No es permitido que sistemas de refrigeración de un solo pase sean instalados en edificios comerciales.


