

# Election Journalism at Mark Keppel High School 1960-61

Monterey Park businessman Johnny Thompson is proud of the 1960-61 editions of The Aztec, Mark Keppel High School's student newspaper. He and Marlene Crawford were staffers and editors of this publication.

Thompson is particularly pleased with the way in which The Aztec covered the 1960 presidential campaign. It was a very special election. On one side was Richard Nixon, a Whittier High School graduate and very skillful debater. John F. Kennedy, Nixon's opponent, was a charming and charismatic public speaker with a Boston accent. Interest in the election was elevated because, for the first time in history, presidential debates were broadcast over national television.

Meanwhile, back at Mark Keppel, Aztec staff committed themselves to the organization of a mock presidential election. Over a four week period, eight thoughtful student editorials were published featuring Democratic and Republican positions on federal aid to education, labor relations, the national economy and foreign policy in a changing world.

Dr. Burton Henry, who was a long-time Monterey Park resident, taught Education Psychology and Sociology at Cal State Los Angeles. He was terrified that some demagogue would emerge, and using fear, as Hitler had done in Germany, take control of the nation. Dr. Henry lectured the future teachers in his classes, including the instructor that had the privilege of teaching the students cited in this article, that it was their duty to teach students critical intelligence.

Students Darlene Lawrence and Dick Dotts contrasted views of the two parties on labor relations in editorials. Dotts asserted that, through Republican leadership, millions of Americans secured expanded employee benefits and the protection of improved safety standards. In addition, railroad workers had been granted better retirement and disability benefits. Furthermore, the Republican Party believed that the key to industrial harmony was mutual respect between labor and management with minimal government interference.

Lawrence countered that the Democratic Party believed the Republican Party had promoted anti-labor policies. She observed that the Democratic Party believed that every American had the right to a job and barriers to that right, such as age, race, skin color, religion and national origin must be

wiped out. Further, the party insists that the minimum wage not only be increased to \$1.25/hour, but expanded to protect millions of workers not currently covered.

In a discussion about foreign policy in a changing world, Bill Barger wrote about the Democratic Party contending that, through cultural exchange programs, the United States will show the world that we share the same goals of dignity, health, freedom, education and a place in the sun as others. This country will work with other nations to achieve those goals. Barger concluded that the Democratic Party believes the only road to a lasting peace is through mutual respect and understanding.

Dennis Silvis observed that President Eisenhower stated that security and a just peace is not a partisan matter. Americans will not allow it to become a pawn in anyone's political chess game. Silvis argued that, with eight years of experience in the Eisenhower Administration, Nixon is in a position to identify the nation's weaknesses and develop programs to promote greater peace and prosperity throughout the world.

In my view, it is tragic that, in recent years, newspapers across the nation have suffered economic reversals and high school journalism has been marginalized. The nation's Founding Fathers, as they expressed in the First Amendment, were fully aware that a vigorous and independent press is

critical to a well-managed democratic government. They had realized that, without the press to protect the public, officials often become arrogant and self-serving. The most refreshing part of the entire project was a post-election editorial written by Dennis Silvis in which he called for national unity. He asked the new President John F. Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson and Adlai Stevenson to collaborate with Dwight Eisenhower, Richard Nixon and Henry Cabot Lodge in developing a worldwide peace mission.

Clearly the Aztec staffers were taught to ask questions and think for themselves. History has revealed that, as Keppel goes, so goes the nation. On election day, local and metropolitan press as well as television covered the event. Kennedy secured 747 votes to Nixon's 637. Johnny Thompson has a right to be proud of The Aztec. The work of those high school students was refreshing, insightful and inspiring!

The Historical Museum of Monterey Park at Garvey Ranch Park is open to the public free of charge each Saturday and Sunday afternoon between the hours of 2-4 p.m. Volunteers are available to answer questions about items on public display as well as those archived in the five room museum. The observatory is open to the public free of charge each Wednesday evening between dusk and 10 p.m. We hope to see you this year!



The official decennial census will not take place until 2020. But in areas of Los Angeles County, the Census Bureau is launching the 2016 Census test to learn how to improve the ways in which the census is conducted. The results of this exercise will have a national impact in 2020.

**Why Should I Participate?**

- The census helps you and your community. Here is how:
- Communities use the information to plan bus routes, draw school district boundaries, and offer community services.
  - Businesses use census data to decide where to put a store, office, or plant. These new locations create jobs and support the community's economy.
  - Businesses use the information to determine what to sell in their stores so communities get what they need.
  - The information helps your community receive funding from the federal government.

**Additional Information about the Census Test**

Some Los Angeles County, Calif., residents will be participating in the 2016 Census Test starting on March 21. The 2016 Census Test is refining new methods and technologies under consideration for the 2020 Census.

Los Angeles County residents will be able to respond to the test in multiple languages including English, Spanish, Chinese and Korean by Internet or mail. Additionally, for those needing help to complete the form, telephone assistance will be provided in Spanish, Chinese (Mandarin, Cantonese), Korean, Vietnamese, Tagalog, Arabic and French. Households

that do not complete the questionnaire may receive a visit from a census taker to complete the form.

The test will consist of the following questions:

- How many people were living or staying in the house, apartment, or mobile home on April 1, 2016?
- Were there any additional people staying here April 1, 2016, that you did not include in question 1?
- Is this a house, apartment or mobile home: owned with a mortgage, owned without a mortgage, rented or occupied without rent?
- What is your telephone number?
- What is Person 1's sex?
- What is Person 1's age and date of birth?
- Which race and Hispanic category describes Person 1?
- Does Person 1 sometimes live or stay somewhere else?

There will also be follow-up questions for each additional person in the household to describe their relationship to the person filling out the questionnaire.

## A "Gladys Kravitz" can be Beneficial to Thwarting Residential Burglaries

In the mid 1960s to early 70s one could be entertained weekly by the beautiful witch Samantha Stephens on the sitcom "Bewitched" starring Elizabeth Montgomery. Married to her mortal husband Darrin, Samantha tried her best to avoid using witchcraft in her busy life as the wife of a successful advertising agent, mother and domestic engineer. Try as she might, something always happened where she would need to use her powers to fix the wrongs that occurred mostly to her husband or to conceal her identity as a witch. This is where Gladys Kravitz comes in.

Gladys and her husband Abner Kravitz were an older couple that appeared to be in retirement as they were always home. Looking to find excitement in her life, Gladys was always looking out her window paying attention to what was going on at the Stephens' residence. Many times Gladys would rush right over to the Stephens' house to get a better look at the activity and quite frequently observe events that could not be explained in the mortal world. Samantha would find a way to turn the events around so that Gladys' proof that Samantha was a witch was debunked. Individuals like Gladys were typically considered to be a "nosy neighbor" but with the success of "Bewitched," the term "Gladys Kravitz" became synonymous.

As the number of residential burglaries increase in the San Gabriel Valley patrol officers in the field wish that there were several Gladys Kravitzes in the community to report

suspicious activity and possibly thwart residential burglaries. During criminal investigations it is frustrating to find a neighbor that saw the suspicious activity, but chose not to report it. Reporting suspicious activity in your neighborhood does not mean that you are being a nosy neighbor. More so, it means that you are a resident concerned about the safety of your neighbors, community and your own property and family - a community hero simply because you chose to pick up the phone and call the police.

By no means are we endorsing residents to peer into their neighbor's window like a "peeping tom." But at a time when residential burglaries are at a high, residents can help thwart burglaries by calling the police on suspicious subjects or activities. Let's face it; though you may not know your neighbors and their regular visitors by name, you are pretty much aware of their daily routines. When you know that your neighbors are away yet you see an unfamiliar subject or subjects walking into their backyard, call the police. If it is determined that the subject(s) are in the backyard for legitimate reasons then no harm, no foul. ## A Guide to the Night Sky

“Blue moon, you saw me standing alone...”

Remember that song? Well this month we will have a blue moon on May 21.



What exactly is a blue moon? Well, for starters, it isn't a color reference. Let me see if I can explain this... The Moon orbits our planet and takes roughly 28 days, or about one month to make one full orbit around Earth, which is why you may have noticed that it rises a little less than an hour later each night (or day). The word month comes from moon.

Now the seasons. Each season is about three months long, so we usually get three full moons in a particular season. But every once in a while - or once in a “blue moon” - we get four full moons in a season. Well, the third full moon in a season is referred to as blue. Now here's where it gets really amazing, this blue moon will be traveling the night sky with two wandering guardians, the planet Mars to the right and the planet Saturn to the left. (The word planet comes from the Greek word for wander.) The trio will rise in the east together on May 21 just after sunset around 8 p.m. or so. Look for them a little later, after the sky is dark, to see their magnificence. Mars will be slightly orangish, though dim, and Saturn will have a barely discernible beige-ish hue. The bright star Antares will be below the Moon and Mars, and the four objects together make a square shape. For all of you Scorpios out there, Antares is the heart of the Scorpion, FYI. Try not to miss this, though, if you do, you can check out the Moon, Mars and Saturn the following night, May

22. The Moon, slowly gliding east, will be to the left of Saturn.

The Moon also does its monthly pairing with the planet Jupiter. Earlier in the month, look for the moon and Jupiter appearing high in the south at dusk on the evening of the 14th as they travel across the night sky as a celestial duo. Jupiter will be the bright, star like object just to the left of the Moon.

But back to the planet Mars. Later this month, Mars will be at opposition. This means that Mars is oppo-site the sun, relative to us, just like when the moon is full, because it's opposite the Sun relative to Earth. From our perspective here on Earth, this appears as Mars rising in the east at sunset, being directly over-head around midnight and setting in the west when the sun rises. However, as the weeks and months go by, and as Earth continues its orbit around the Sun (which is slightly faster than Mars' orbit around the Sun), Mars will rise earlier and earlier, and will drift off to the west sooner and sooner, as Earth glides past “The God of War.”

Have a fantastic month and remember to look up at the wondrous show going on overhead every night.



## The Greenhouse at Baldwin's Discovery Garden Continues to Evolve

In the "Hands-On" Science elective class at Martha Baldwin School, the edible school garden has now become a "Discovery Garden". Throughout the school year the garden has expanded and will continue to be enhanced and improved. One improvement will be to build a fence around the garden area along with multiple pinwheels and many types of herbs and vegetables. The Discovery Garden area will also contain hydroponics, which is growing plants in water with added nutrients but without soil. There will also be a soda bottle garden, where the students will grow plants in recycled bottles and can also view the plant's growth through the transparent plastic. Lastly, students plan to place a cover over the greenhouse to serve as a shelter from extreme weather conditions. The Discovery Garden is a project in which both students and teachers will contribute to the process as they learn new skills and gain knowledge along the way.

The greenhouse includes plants such as lettuce, bell pepper, tomatoes, and parsley. Though the garden initially lacked the proper protection, the help of 32 students of different grade levels allowed the greenhouse barricade to be completed fairly quickly. Seventh grade teacher, Mrs. Allaf, has been very thorough and introduced each step to the students meticulously. The wall around the greenhouse consists of approximately 150 recycled CD cases. Each one was taken apart with conscientious effort before being glued together to form a barrier for the edible garden. At first, the constant wind frequently knocked the barricade over, but as a class, wooden sticks were placed to help stabilize the wall. Mrs. Allaf allows every student to take part in this project and is very open to new ideas. She constantly incorporates new improvements to the garden and at the same time, establishes essential lessons necessary to everyday life.

Students of all grade levels, from Pre-K to 8, have access to the edible garden and are also allowed to contribute to this project. The purpose of a greenhouse is to promote hands-on learning experience and even perhaps stimulate interest in students to create their own edible garden at home. Not only can it be an excellent experience for students of all ages, it can also supply students to adopt a healthier lifestyle, which is extremely significant for maturing bodies. It can help both the staff and students become more familiar with the process of plant growth and the basics of care. Gardening activities can help engage students to learn in new ways and to interact with nature. This involvement also teaches responsibility and the importance of cooperation with all the students constantly teaming up to work together. It allows further familiarity of having to collaborate with people you may not normally talk to. This project has shown excellent outcomes and as the greenhouse continues to prosper, the students will continue to assimilate more and more beneficial information.

# Fremont Elementary Students Dive Into Read-A-Thon

The 564 students of Fremont Elementary are hoping to set a new personal record -- a record in the number of pages read and a chance to be crowned the school's Top Reader. On Read Across America Day (March 2, 2016), students began the non-profit Jester & Pharley Phund's Reading Makes A Difference Read-A-Thon to donate copies of "The Jester Has Lost His Jingle" children's book to local hospitalized children.

The program, sponsored by the Joseph Drown Foundation, revolves around The N.Y. Times best-selling children's book written and illustrated by David Saltzman. The Yale University graduate died at 22 on March 2, which coincidentally is birthday of David's favorite author, Dr. Seuss.

Students will be reading daily for five weeks, keeping track of the number of pages they read on a Jester reading log to help David's parents keep a promise they made to David -- to give ill children copies of his book and a doll to lift their spirits.

Over the duration of three assemblies, Barbara Saltzman, David's mother, talked to students about how her son created the story, for which Maurice Sendak wrote the Afterword. "David's favorite childhood authors were Sendak and Dr. Seuss," she said. "It was appropriate that the Reading Makes A Difference program started on the day that David and Dr. Seuss share in such a meaningful way. Every student from transitional kindergarten through eighth grade listened so intently as I read David's story and talked about the 'secrets'

of the book's creation. I anticipate that they'll create new reading records," said Saltzman.

David's book is celebrating its 20th anniversary in print and has inspired students around the country to read more than 40 million pages in Jester & Pharley Phund read-a-thons to give the book and its accompanying Jester & Pharley Doll to local hospitalized patients.

The Jester & Pharley Fund has its genesis in David's uplifting story, which entrances children and helps ignite an interest in reading and compassion among students participating in the literacy program. "It was wonderful for the students to hear about David's journey in writing and illustrating the book," noted Leann Huang, Ed.D, Instructional Specialist. "We hope this exposure will inspire our students to explore possible careers as authors and/or illustrators."

The Jester Recognition Assembly honoring the top readers and top-reading classrooms at each grade level will take place May 13, 2016, with a long list of surprises in store for Fremont student readers. The benefiting hospital will be revealed at the pep rally for reading.

This reading program has been extremely beneficial for the students of Fremont Students and future participation seems probable in the district. "We'd love to bring this program to more schools in the Alhambra Unified School District, where both I and David's father, USC Professor Joe

Saltzman, attended school," Saltzman said. Needless to say, this competition will prove to be beneficial for both the readers and the children in need, just as David Saltzman intended.


# Marguerita Hosts Annual Open House

# AUSD High School Bond Measure Proves to be a District-Wide Success

On November 2, 2004, voters passed the High School Bond Measure “C” which allowed the District to make a multitude of improvements to the schools that would never have been possible otherwise. Through years of dedicated planning and execution, the District exhibited to the community that they could spend the money effectively and make the necessary improvements that would benefit the greatest amount of students.

The strategic goals of the High School Bond were to close the achievement gap among schools and demographic groups and to provide an equitable distribution of learning opportunities for students across the four high schools. This would lead to a sufficient flexibility in curriculum and facilities at each high school to accommodate different learning models as they develop. These goals were achieved through a well thought-out plan developed based on the needs established by the stakeholders who determined the most critical need at each site. Committee members then voted on the issues and a complete list was generated and distributed for final approval.

### Alhambra High School

At AHS, the project started with the construction of six CIF approved tennis courts with 12’ high fencing and windscreens. Complementing the property adjacent to the new tennis courts, the portable classroom structures were removed from site and replaced with a new 2-story high-tech Science Building with ten laboratories, six workrooms, an elevator and restrooms. The gym received upgrades including new bleachers, doors, sport flooring, finishes, and restroom and foyer renovations. Alhambra’s Career Tech program was accented with a Culinary Arts Classroom renovation including amenities to assist with teaching students commercial kitchen skills. Team rooms were upgraded to meet Title IX requirements while Buildings C&D received an upgraded HVAC system, and the Auditorium was upgraded with new seating and finishes.

### San Gabriel High School

SGHS received numerous improvements in both the educational and athletic sectors. These transformations included HVAC and electrical improvements, seismic upgrades, Career Tech additions and gym lockers replacement. The Multi-Purpose Room was revamped to become an inviting arena for both students and staff. The Matador athletic fields and track were upgraded with synthetic surfaces as well as upgraded sound and lighting systems. Technology upgrades exhibit digital projection and sound, upgraded data ports and electrical. The Auditorium received new seating as well along with a new control room, theatrical lighting, and rigging system. The tennis courts were resurfaced and restriped with drainage to direct surface water away from the courts. The bus drop-off area received waterproof canopies to shelter the students from adverse weather conditions while waiting for their transportation. Also, recently completed are bleacher modifications in the two gyms.

### Mark Keppel High School

Mark Keppel High School had the first major renovation to the campus from its original construction done in 1954. Initial project priority scope included three major building additions to the existing campus: a gymnasium, a three-story classroom and music building and a two-story science classroom building. Total added square footage was 80,000 SF. of teaching space. The gymnasium expansion included restroom facilities, two classroom/ team rooms, storage, and provided seating for 500 people through expandable bleachers on a court capable of accommodating basketball, badminton, and volleyball. The Auditorium was upgraded with new seating, theatrical lighting, rigging systems, and finishes. Renovations at MKHS included the girl’s team/ locker rooms and its circulation tied into the existing locker facilities, old gym upgrades, and new coaches’ offices, library remodel, and science wing modernization. A new

phone and Public Address system has been installed, along with a campus-wide wireless access infrastructure and security camera system. The lunch courtyard is accented with shade canopies, sound system, and comforting landscaping. The Maintenance Building has a new home, while the additional parking lot entry/drop off south of the newly painted Administration Building accommodates parents, staff, and visitors alike.

### Century High School – New Campus

A new campus for a continuing high school was built to replace the previous 1960 era modular buildings. The work included demolishing the existing campus and the construction of the three new two-story buildings housing nine classrooms, an administration building, a library/media center, a student lunch building, and site work on a reconfigured 1.1-acre parcel. As part of the project, the existing site was re-oriented and the transportation center was moved to the central district offices. The remaining parcel was sold and the additional monies went back to the District coffers. The library/media center provided bookshelves and displays around the perimeter of the room and a computer/ learning center for 30 stations in the center of the library. Total square footage for the buildings was approximately 14,277 SF. The buildings are connected by a covered walk-way at the first and second floors. The vertical circulation is from two main stairs and an ADA accessible elevator.

Without this Board’s proactive gestures and the communities support, this bond measure would not have happened and these advancements in infrastructure and betterments in the learning environment for the four High Schools would not be a reality today. We can say with satisfaction and surety that the Alhambra Unified School District High Schools are much better off today than 8 years ago.


