Farmers' Market Tip of the Month

There's nothing quite like biting into a ripe, fresh and sweet piece of stone fruit. To ensure you select the best possible piece of stone fruit, whether it is a peach, apricot, or nectarine, it's important to notice the fruit's color, aroma and texture. For example stone fruit that is under-ripe sometimes have green patches, while older fruit may have wrinkly areas. If you aren't sure which one to pick, just ask the farmer. They are happy to help.

Monterey Park's 100th Birthday Celebration Off to a Festive Start

The City of Monterey Park launched its centennial celebration into high gear with a special May 14 ceremony to dedicate a time capsule that will be buried in front of city hall plus the unveiling of the centennial monument mock-up which will also be installed in front of city hall.

The time capsule will feature pictures of city landmarks, parks, buildings, neighborhoods, and a copy of the city budget to give future residents an idea of what Monterey Park was like in 2016. In addition, the capsule will contain local newspapers and magazines that give information on what was happening in the Southern California region including Dodger baseball tickets, the cost of a loaf of bread and more.


The city hall ceremony was also graced

with the return of many former city mayors, clerks, and city treasurers who acted as the honorary grand marshals for the annual Play Days Parade.

The ceremony concluded with the slicing of the city's birthday cake, which was a replica of the Cascades Waterfall.

Monterey Park's 100th birthday party celebration continues with the first in a series of fun summer concerts. The ABCs of Summer Pool Safety

While many people enjoy a nice day by the pool, safety should always be of the utmost importance. It doesn't take much for a fun day at the pool to turn dangerous.

Drowning is the number one killer of children under the age of five and - even more alarming - is 100% preventable. Your swimming pool and spa should be a place of enjoyment and relaxation and not a place of worry. The solution, while simple, is often overlooked by pool users. The Monterey Park Fire Department would like to provide some very simple steps to make the summer safe and enjoyable for all.

Adult Supervision

- Assign an adult to supervise children in and around the swimming pool and spa. This is needed whether there is one parent or guardian present, or numerous adults present such as during a family event or party.
- Maintain constant eye-to-eye supervision with children in and around the swimming pool and spa.
- Remove children from the swimming pool and spa area for any distraction such as a telephone call, use of restroom, etc.
- Issue the adult supervisor an item such as a whistle, bracelet, etc. to reinforce which adult is in charge of the safety of the children.
- Floaties or other inflatable flotation devices are not life jackets and should

never be substituted for adult supervision.

- Maintain a clear view (no trees, bushes or other obstacles) from the home to the swimming pool and spa.
- Ensure any adult responsible for the children know the emergency services telephone number and also your location address in the event emergency personnel are needed to be called to the scene.

Barriers

- Have a fence enclosure that isolates your swimming pool and spa from the home, play areas, front and side yards and the neighbor's yard.
- Make sure all gates in the isolation fence are self-closing and self-latching.
- Multiple layers of barriers isolating the pool and spa from children should be installed. In addition to an isolation fence, one or more of the following safety features can provide the additional protection necessary:
- Approved swimming pool and spa safety cover.
- Approved swimming pool and spa alarm.
- Exit alarms on doors providing access to the swimming pool and spa.
- Keep all doors and windows leading to the swimming pool and spa area locked.
- Doors providing access to the swimming pool and spa equipped to be self-closing and self-latching with a release mechanism high enough to be out of the reach of a child.

- Perimeter yard fence provided with a self-closing and self-latching gate.
- All chairs, tables, large toys or other objects that would allow a child to climb up to reach the gate latch or enable the child to climb over the isolation fence should be removed or kept inside the fenced area.

Classes

- Learn how to perform Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR).
- Visit the American Heart Association website at www.heart.org to sign-up for a CPR class, learn lifesaving skills or to purchase an at-home training kit.
- Enroll your child in swimming lessons. Pool safety should be the responsibility of everyone. Let's work together to make this summer incident free. Should you have any questions or concerns, please don't hesitate to stop by a fire station for additional information.

Pet Owner Community Nuisance Issues

It is part of the mission of the Monterey Park Animal Control Bureau to help people and animals live harmoniously together in our community. There are times when certain behaviors disrupt residents' peaceful enjoyment of their homes and property. Listed below is a common community nuisance issue involving pets, and information regarding the applicable law(s) and ordinances that address them.

Cleaning Up After Pets

Excessive accumulation of animal waste on a pet owner's property creates unsanitary conditions that are offensive to neighbors and unsafe for people and pets. Pet owners who fail to pick up waste deposited by their pets while on walks also contribute to unsanitary conditions for others.

Pet owners are required by City ordinance 8.02.160 Nuisance prohibited:

"No owner or custodian of any dog allow or permit that dog to defecate or commit a nuisance on any public property or any private property other than that of the owner or

custodian of the dog. It is the duty of every owner or custodian of a dog to curb the dog in order to carry out the intent of this section. (Ord. 2114 § 2, 2014)"

This includes regularly removing and disposing of pet waste from one's private property as well as removing and discarding their pet's waste that has been deposited on others' property as well as public property.

Safety Tips for Seniors

Senior Citizens currently represent the most rapidly growing segment of the population in the United States. Reducing the fear of crime and increasing security conscious behavior is one of the primary goals of the Monterey Park Police Department. In order to achieve this goal, here are a few tips you can follow to help keep yourself safe and make it tough for criminals to operate in your community.

While at home:

- Never open your door for strangers, always utilize your peephole. If you do not have a peephole, have one installed.
- Lock your doors and windows, including your garage door.
- Vary your daily routine if possible.
- Utilize your Neighborhood Watch. A concerned neighbor is often the best protection against crime.
- Don't leave notes on your door when going out.
- Notify your neighbors and the police when you leave on vacation.
- Ask for proper identification from delivery persons or strangers, don't be afraid of asking, if they are legitimate they won't mind.
- Never give out personal information over the phone: the IRS, police, and courts will never ask for payment over the phone.
- If you arrive at home and suspect a stranger may be inside, DON'T GO IN! Leave quietly and call 9-1-1.

While walking:

- Avoid walking alone at night.
- Always plan your route and stay alert to your surroundings, walk confidently.
- Have a companion accompany you.
- Walk in well lighted areas.
- Have your key ready when approaching your front door.

While in your car:

- Always keep your car doors locked.
- Do not leave valuables in your car.
- Never give strangers a ride.

Banking:

- Utilize direct deposit if possible.
- Never withdraw money from your bank accounts for anyone except yourself.
- Never give your money to someone who calls on you identifying themselves as a bank official. A bank will never ask you to withdraw money.
- If you have been swindled or conned, report the crime to the police. Con artist count on their victim's reluctance to admit they have been duped. If you delay, you help them get away. If you never report the crime, they are free to cheat others.

The men and women of the Monterey Park Police Department care about the senior citizens in our community. We are dedicated to providing you with the highest level of service. These are just a few tips that you can use to help safeguard yourself and your property against crime. Most importantly, never feel bad for calling the police, we are here for you.

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Bulky Item, Furniture or Appliance Pickup

Bulky items that are too large to fit in the trash container such as mattresses, sofas, rugs, lamps, stoves, refrigerators, chairs, desks, as well as bundles of cardboard or palm fronds can be picked up by Athens Services on the day of collection. Do not leave these items on the curbside without first making an appointment. Follow these three steps:

- Call Athens Services at 888-336-6100 during business hours at least 24-hours before your next collection day
- Provide Athens Services with your address and cross

street, pick-up day, and list of items for removal. Athens may also provide you with additional instructions

- Place bulky items out for pickup by 6 a.m. on your collection day. Items must be stored out of public view prior to 24 hours before your collection day. Please remove or secure all appliance doors to protect children.

Following these guidelines will help keep Monterey Park's streets clean and safe.

A Guide to the Night Sky

We're halfway through the year already! Where does the time go? Luckily, Jupiter, Saturn and Mars will be putting on quite the astronomical show this month to lift our spirits and maybe help us to slow things down a bit.

Jupiter will be the very bright, star-like object high in the SSW after sunset, gleaming within the boundaries of Leo the Lion (look for the group of stars that look like a big backwards question mark to the right of Jupiter). As Jupiter drifts westward, look for Mars and Saturn slowly rising in the SE, again just after sunset. Mars will be the bright, orangish "star" (just before Scorpius the Scorpion) and Saturn, though well within Scorpius, appears relatively dim and follows not too far behind Mars.

Although hard to spot in the sky if you don't know where or when to look, Saturn is the quintessential, ringed planet. Named after the god of agriculture, Saturn, like Jupiter, is a giant ball of gas, so, there is no surface on which to land or walk. It's so far away that it looks a lot less stunning than Jupiter does. In fact, it doesn't really stand out at all, except for a barely discernible beige color and the fact that it doesn't twinkle. Its ring system, which stretches a distance that's roughly 3/4 of the way from Earth to the Moon (about 175,000 miles) is made mostly of water ice - and while impressive in length, the vertical height, or thickness, is only about 30 feet.

Saturn is also about 880 million miles away from the Sun, and this month about 790 million miles away from us here on Earth. Translated into the speed of light - when you see Saturn, you are seeing as it was roughly one hour and ten minutes ago, since it took that long for the light to leave Saturn and reach your eye. Let that sink in for a moment. While our beautiful planet takes about 365 days to orbit the sun, Saturn

takes 29 years to make one full orbit (which makes me about 1 and 3/4 years old on Saturn).

The best way to spot Saturn is by using the Moon. The Sun, Moon and planets all travel the same path in the sky (called the ecliptic). On the evening of June 11th, the Moon and Jupiter appear together high in the SW after dusk - around 8:30 p.m. Look for both on that one night only as they quickly drift westward - because remember, the Moon is always moving slowly to the east, although it appears to us (as we spin on our axis) that everything in the sky moves in a westward direction. Therefore, six days later, on the evening of the 17th, the Moon will have slipped further east and will now travel the sky between both Mars and Saturn. Mars will be the bright, orangish beacon on the right and below the Moon and Saturn will be the less bright, but steady beige-ish beacon to the left of the moon - both almost equidistant from it.

On the following night, the Moon, on its continuous eastward path, will have slipped past Saturn, now traveling just to the left of the ringed gas giant.

So until next month, keep looking up - it's astronomically awesome up there!

Who is That Highly Qualified Public Safety Dispatcher?

The Monterey Park Police Department hopes that it might be you! We are currently recruiting candidates for the position of communications dispatcher.

Public safety dispatchers are truly the lifeline for the community; they are the first people to answer a citizen's call for help. Before the police, fire department, or paramedics can respond to a call for service, the dispatcher interviews the caller, quickly decides what action to take, and sets the wheels in motion for emergency assistance. Dispatchers answer 9-1-1 calls as well as non-emergency calls and a wide variety of general information calls from the public. Being a dispatcher means you never know what's going to happen when you answer the phone: it might be someone asking for directions to the police station, or it might be a frantic caller reporting a baby not breathing, a traffic accident, or someone breaking into their home. The ability to communicate clearly and quickly prioritize a request for help could mean the difference between life and death for a citizen or a first responder.

Dispatchers are responsible for keeping track of all the public safety resources they monitor; such as police officers, fire department personnel, and emergency medical services. In addition to answering calls for service, they answer requests for information from the police officers who are patrolling the city looking for suspicious people, enforcing traffic laws, and proactively crushing crime. If a police officer becomes involved in an emergency situation such as a fight, a foot chase, or a vehicle pursuit, the dispatcher is responsible for sending assistance and getting as much assistance to the officer as possible.

Dispatchers must have the ability to remain calm under intense pressure while

frequently switching tasks and using a computer to document information. All of their activity is recorded, whether on a computer or a telephone line. Radio transmissions must be quickly answered, even if the dispatcher is on the telephone with a caller reporting an emergency. If a police officer calls for assistance or requests information, the dispatcher must handle the request as quickly as possible. Last year, our Communications Dispatchers answered nearly 19,000 emergency 9-1-1 calls, and nearly 100,000 phone calls for both emergency and non emergency assistance. They handle countless radio transmissions for emergency services. Requests for fire department and medical emergencies are transferred to our partnering agency, however, we monitor the calls and often send police officers to assist our fire department and paramedics on calls for service.

We are extremely fortunate in Monterey Park to have a team of tenured communications dispatchers who have been serving this community together for many years. Dispatchers undergo an extensive testing process that includes a written test, interviews, a background investigation, and psychological and medical testing prior to appointment. Training includes a formal course certified by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training, as well as 3-6 months of on the job training. Our dispatchers are a talented bunch and we couldn't protect the community without them. Think you have what it takes to join our team? If you'd like more information contact Lt. Monterey Park Woman's Club

The Monterey Park Woman's Club began with the name of Ramona Acres in February, 1915 when the area that became Monterey Park was called Ramona Acres. Twenty-five women came together to form a social club that would put their focus and energy into helping in the community. The club was accepted into Federation with the California Federation of Women's Clubs and the General Federation of Women's Clubs in May of 1915. The club was incorporated in 1920 and was still known as the Ramona Acres Woman's Club until January, 1958 when the name was changed to indicate the club's location, then becoming the Monterey Park Woman's Club. The established motto of the club was "Work for Some Good", a motto taken seriously from the beginning until the present.

The club barely began meeting when Alhambra and South Pasadena proposed turning the area of Ramona Acres into a sewage treatment plant. The people were very upset by this proposal and they started a petition to incorporate and avoid the action of those who did not live in the area. The women in the club carried petitions from door to door and encouraged citizens to approve the incorporation of Monterey Park. It was a big project but they were victorious in their efforts and Ramona Acres became a city in 1916.

There have been many changes that have occurred in the club over the years and yet many things have continued and stayed the same over all of its 101 years. They saw needs in the community and helped in whatever way they could. In 1920 a well baby clinic was started and opened with 45 babies being looked at on the first day of the opening. This clinic was held the first and third Friday of the month and operated until 1972.

Other areas of the Monterey Park Woman's Club's philanthropy work over a very long time, according to past club records, have included financial donations that continue until this day. Three groups - MERCI, Monterey Park Bruggemeyer Memorial Library, and Mark Keppel High School music programs, have been the recipients of the club's support for a very long time. The club managed the first library in the city and when the current library began serving the community the club donated all of their books to the new library. Members have volunteered at book sales and attend their fund raising events. Mark Keppel High School music students have traditionally entertained the club during each club year and have been given both donations and scholarships. MERCI, too, has been a favorite organization that members have enjoyed supporting since its beginnings.

Many other organizations and community events that are newer are supported with both financial and in-kind giving. Some of the current recipients of our philanthropy are: Domestic Violence Action Coalition at the district level (helping victims of violence), Tech Trek Scholarships (for 12 year old girls attending summer STEM Programs for a week on a University or College Campus), MPFD Spark of Love, Returning To Higher Education Student Scholarship (for recovering women victims of violence and addictions), and many city wide events.

During both World War I and World War II the club was very active with the USO. They wrapped bandages, knitted socks, sewed and helped the Red Cross with whatever was needed. When World War II started, the club president became a naturalized citizen and presided over their Christmas meeting, all on the same day. She went on to be the resident hostess at the local USO.

While sewing began with the Red Cross in 1942, it continued as the women met weekly after the war and switched to sew and make garments for children and youth that were residents in an

orphanage and later for Juvenile Hall that was renamed Lathrop Hall and then McLaren Hall. Women sewed simple clothing of shift dresses and shirts and they routinely made 100 to 325 garments each year, continuing this project until the 1980s.

Membership numbers has fluctuated a great deal over the years from the original 25 women to our current 48. Numbers grew into the high 100s and while there are no statistics available, our records show that there was a huge drop during the Depression years and in then again in the 1960s and 1970s when women with families began returning to the work force.

The remaining members did what they could, held potluck dinners and provided much of their own programs with a notation that one year in the late 30s they only spent \$8.00 on programs. It should be noted that during 1937, Nell Bruggemeyer wrote and produced several programs, including one program on "Famous Women in History" for a community fundraiser. This was long before the National Women's History Month in March, which we now celebrate each year. She received many accolades for the performance.

The Monterey Park Woman's Club established a building fund in 1919. They had the opportunity to purchase the lot on Garvey Avenue where our current post office is located for \$1,000. When the county library offered to rent a facility at that location the members quickly raised more money and a building was erected but unfinished on the interior. A 1921 record tells of polished floors and books lining the walls. In 1922 a loan of \$2,000 was granted for the finishing of the building on Garvey Avenue. This remained their headquarters until the late 1950s.

During the 1956-57 year ten service clubs joined together to pledge money towards the construction of a building on city property at the corner of McPherrin and Harding. The club pledged the second highest amount after the Lion's Club with a \$7,500 pledge but additional money given totaled \$8,500. The members then gave \$750 for the flooring, \$1,500 was given for the purchase of silverware and china. Later \$500 was donated for the stage draperies. The club ended up really helping the present Service Club House become a usable facility. It was quite a commitment but one that the women were proud to have done.

Today, the Monterey Park Woman's Club is the oldest service club in Monterey Park. We meet every second Wednesday of the month at 10 a.m. with a business meeting and program, with occasional socials on the fourth Wednesdays of the month. All interested women and men who wish to be of service to our city and give support to worthwhile organization projects will always be welcomed to attend and join. We meet at the Service Club House on the corner of McPherrin and Harding. Current plans are in the works to start an evening meeting for the convenience of working members. AUSD Saves Community \$5.9m Through Recent Bond Refunding

Over the years, AUSD has been extremely proactive in improving the educational experience of students and teachers, particularly through transforming their facilities in an effort to provide a balanced distribution of opportunities for students. These actions have been made possible by a series of bond measures. These bonds, which became effective in 1999, 2004 and 2008, have provided vast enhancements throughout the district, which included new classrooms, athletic complexes, playground equipment,

science labs, security systems and other valuable resources.

Another positive component of this process that has recently developed is a refunding of these bonds worth \$39 million. The biggest accomplishment of this refunding is that it has dropped the property tax rate to the lowest in LA County without extending the repayment period, thus stretching the taxpayer's money much farther than expected. Ultimately, this refinancing resulted in saving the community an estimated \$5.9 million.

When taking into consideration AUSD's construction bond history and the recent refinancing, the District has proven up to the challenge in a variety of ways. Not only has AUSD made improvements to the schools, but the District has also exceeded expectations in spending the community's bond money efficiently and effectively through unparalleled planning and management. With the help of the community, AUSD was able to accomplish the goals for its schools in a responsible manner so that students can continue to achieve enormous success.

Eight AUSD Elementary Schools Win Gold Ribbon Recognition

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlarkson has announced that 772 elementary schools are being honored under the Gold Ribbon Schools Awards Program. Amongst the 772 award winning schools are AUSD's Brightwood, Marguerita, Monterey Highlands, Northrup, Park, Ramona, Repetto and Ynez. Additionally, Monterey highlands also received the Exemplary Physical Activity and Nutrition Program Award.

"These schools shine as bright beacons for others, putting forth an exemplary effort to ensure that every student is ready for 21st century college and careers," Torlarkson said.

The California Gold Ribbon Schools Award was created to honor schools in place of the California Distinguished

Schools Program, which is on hiatus while California creates new assessment and accountability systems. Nearly 6,000 elementary schools were eligible to apply this year.

Schools applied for the award based on a model program or practice their school has adopted that includes standards-based activities, strategies and practices that can be replicated by other local educational agencies. The award recognized middle and high schools last year.

The Gold Ribbon Awards recognize California Schools that have made gains in implementing the academic content and performance standards adopted by the State Board of Education. These standards include the California Standards for English Language Arts and Mathematics, California

English Development standards and next Generation Science Standards.

The 2016 Elementary Schools as well as the 2016 Exemplary Program recipients, Title 1 Academic Achieving Schools, 2016 Green Ribbon Schools, 2016 Civic Learning Award Schools and the National Blue Ribbon Schools from 2015 will be honored in May/June during regional ceremonies held in Santa Clara, Anaheim, Los Angeles, Visalia and Sacramento.

"We are so proud of our students, teachers and administrators for all the work they have done. This is a testimony to the wonderful schools we have in the district," shared AUSD Superintendent Laura Tellez-Gagliano.

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
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SELFIE: "OMG! I Have "Horsey" Teeth!

有關寵物在本社區的擾民問題

幫助居民和寵物在本社區內和睦相處是蒙特利公園市動物管理局的職責工作之一。然而，寵物有時會對社區居民的家園和環境帶來困擾。下面列舉了社區內發生的一些典型的寵物擾民行為，以及針對此類行為的適用法律和法規資訊。

為您的寵物“善後”

動物糞便在寵物主人地界線內大量堆積糞便將造成環境髒亂，並對左鄰右舍造成干擾，影響居民和寵物的安全。主人將寵物帶出門溜達時，未能收拾其遺留的糞便，對他人的環境同樣會造成污染。

城市法第8.02.160條“滋擾行為”向寵物主人提出要求：“任何寵物狗的主人或看管人都不能其寵物在公共環境或私人場所排泄糞便或滋擾他人。本規定旨在提醒，約束自己的寵物是每位寵物主人或看管人份內的責任（條款2114 § 2, 2014年）。”

這包括定期打掃和清除寵物在自己的地界線領域內、其他人地界線領域內以及公共地界線領域內留下的排泄物。

謹記，作為寵物主人，要做一個有責任感有公德心的寵物主人

Hay momentos en que ciertos comportamientos interrumpen la paz y tranquilidad que los residentes disfrutan en sus hogares y propiedades. A continuacin enumeramos un comn y molesto problema de la comunidad que involucra mascotas, e informacin concerniente a la ley(es) aplicable y las ordenanzas que se ocupan de ellos.

Limpia Tras las Mascotas

La acumulacin excesiva de residuos de animales en la propiedad del dueo de una mascota crea condiciones insalubres que son ofensivas para los vecinos y peligrosas para las personas y las mascotas. Los dueos de mascotas que no recogen los residuos depositados por sus mascotas, cuando salen a caminar, tambn contribuyen a las condiciones insalubres para los dems.

Los dueos de mascotas son requeridos por

la Ordenanza de la Ciudad 8.02.160, Prohibido las Molestias, que:

“Ningn dueo o encargado de cualquier perro permita al perro a defecar o cometer alguna molestia en cualquier propiedad pblica o privada que no sea la del dueo o del guardin del perro. Es el deber de todo dueo o guardin de un perro el restringir a su perro con el fin de llevar a cabo la intencin de esta seccin. (Ord. 2114 § 2, 2014)”

Esto incluye el regularmente eliminar y disponer de los desechos de las mascotas de su propiedad privada, as como remover y desechar los residuos de su mascota que han sido depositados en la propiedad de los dems as como en propiedad pblica.

El Abecedario Sobre la Seguridad en la Piscina Durante el Verano

Mientras que mucha gente disfruta de un bonito da en la piscina, la seguridad debe ser siempre de mucha importancia. No toma mucho para que un da divertido se convierta en peligroso.

El ahogamiento es la causa principal de la mortalidad de los nios menores de cinco aos y - an ms alarmante - es 100% evitable. Su piscina y spa deberan de ser un lugar de diversin y relajacin y no un lugar de preocupacin. La solucin, aunque sencilla, es generalmente ignorada por los que usan la piscina. Al Departamento de Bomberos de Monterey Park le gustara proporcionarles algunos consejos sencillos para que todos puedan tener un verano seguro y divertido.

Supervisin Adulta

- Asignar un adulto para supervisar a los nios en y alrededor de la piscina y spa. Esto es necesario as haya un padre o tutor presente, o numerosos adultos presentes tal como durante reuniones familiares o fiestas.
- Mantener constante supervisin directa con los nios en o alrededor de la piscina y spa.
- Sacar a los nios del rea de la piscina y spa si hay alguna distraccin, ya sea una llamada telefnica, si tiene que ir al bao, etc.
- Darle al supervisor adulto un artculo tal como un pito, brazalete, etc., para reafirmar cul adulto est a cargo de la seguridad de los nios.
- Los flotadores u otros aparatos de flotacin inflables no son chalecos salvavidas y nunca deben de ser sustituidos por la supervisin adulta.
- Mantener una vista despejada (sin rboles, arbustos u otros obstculos) desde la casa hasta la piscina y alberca.
- Asegrese de que el adulto responsable de los nios sabe cul es el nmero de telfono del servicio de emergencia y la direccin de dnde estn en caso de que el personal de emergencia tenga que ser llamado a la escena.

Barreras

- Tenga una cerca que separe la piscina y spa de la casa, reas de juego, jardines o patios

delanteros y lados y de la propiedad del vecino.

- Asegrese de que todas las puertas de la cerca puedan cerrarse y asegurarse automticamente.
- Varias otras barreras para aislar la piscina y spa de los nios deberan ser instaladas. Adems de la cerca, una o ms de las siguientes medidas de seguridad pueden proporcionar la necesaria proteccin adicional:
 - o Cobertura de seguridad aprobada para la piscina y spa.
 - o Alarma aprobada para la piscina y spa.
 - o Alarmas de salida en las puertas que proporcionan acceso a la piscina y spa.
- Mantengan todas las puertas y ventanas que conducen al rea de la piscina y spa cerradas con llave.
- Las puertas que tienen acceso a la piscina y spa que estn equipadas para cerrarse y asegurarse automticamente deben de tener el mecanismo para abrirlas suficientemente alto para que no estn al alcance de los nios.
- La cerca en el permetro del patio debe de tener una puerta que se cierre y se asegure automticamente.
- Todas las sillas, mesas, juguetes grandes y otros objetos que pueden permitir que el nio pueda subirse y alcanzar el seguro de la puerta o treparse sobre la cerca deben quitarse o mantenerse dentro del rea cercada.

Clases

- Aprenda cmo hacer la Resucitacin Cardiopulmonar (CPR).
 - Visite la red de American Heart Association en el www.heart.org para registrarse en una clase de CPR, aprenda tcnicas para salvar vidas o compre un equipo de aprendizaje en casa.
 - Registre a su nio en lecciones de natacin.
- La seguridad en la piscina debe de ser la responsabilidad de todos. Vamos a trabajar juntos para que ste verano est libre de incidentes. Si usted tiene preguntas o preocupaciones, por favor no dude en ir a una estacin de bomberos para obtener informacin adicional.

夏日游泳池安全事項ABC

當許多人在游泳池享受美好一天時，安全永遠應該是至關重要的。在游泳池玩耍，不需要花快樂一天的多長時間，就會變得很危險。

溺水是五歲以下兒童的頭號殺手，而且更驚人的是—100%可預防的。您的游泳池和水療池應該是一個讓人享受和放鬆的地方，而不是讓人擔心的地方。解決方法雖然簡單，卻經常被游泳池使用者忽視。蒙特利公園市消防局願意提供一些非常簡單的步驟，讓所有人渡過一個安全和愉快的夏天。

成人看管

- 在游泳池和水療池周邊指派一個成年人看管兒童。必須要有一位家長或監護人在現場，或者有很多成年人在場，例如在家庭聚會或派對上。
- 在游泳池和水療池四週，監護人要保持注意力在兒童身上。
- 如在通話中，或使用洗手間等會讓人分心的情況下，讓孩子們遠離游泳池和水療區域。
- 為加強負責兒童安全的成年人裝備，給成年監護人派發類似哨，手環等物品。
- 可浮標或其它充氣浮標裝置並不是救生衣，也不應該用這些裝置來代替成人看管。
- 從家到游泳池和水療池之間，要保持一個清晰的視野(沒有樹木，灌木或其他障礙物遮擋)
- 確保任何負責兒童安全的成年人知道緊急服務電話號碼，以及事件中您的所在地位置，同時，也需要召集應急醫療人員趕赴現場。

隔離裝置

- 從房屋，遊樂區，前院和側院，以及鄰居的院子，到您的游泳池和水療池之間，要有圍欄隔離著。
- 確保圍欄上的所有大門都是自動關閉和自動鎖上。
- 應安裝多重安全障礙物或裝置，把兒童和游泳池以及水療池隔離開來。除了隔離圍欄以外，以下一個或多個安全設施，可以提供必要的額外保護：
 - o 經過檢驗認可的游泳池和水療池安全蓋。
 - o 經過檢驗認可的游泳池和水療池報警器。
 - o 提供通往游泳池和水療池大門的出口報警器。
- 鎖定所有通往游泳池和水療區的門窗
- 通往游泳池和水療區的大門裝備，必須是自動關閉和自動鎖定的，開鎖閘門應該具有兒童碰不到的高度。
- 院子圍牆應提供一個帶有自動關閉和自動鎖定的大門。
- 所有椅子，桌子，大型玩具或其他可以讓兒童爬上去觸碰大門門鎖，或讓兒童翻過隔離圍欄的物體，都應該搬走或放在圍欄區內。

課程

- 學習如何進行心肺復甦(CPR)。
- 瀏覽美國心臟協會網站，地址：www.heart.org，登記註冊CPR課程，學習救生技能或購買居家培訓工具包。
- 為您的孩子註冊游泳課程。

游泳池安全應該是每一個人的責任。讓我們一起努力，避免夏日意外事件發生。若您有任何疑問或意見，請親臨消防局查詢額外信息。

龐大物品是指放不進垃圾桶裡的物品，如床墊，沙發，地毯，落地燈，爐灶，冰箱，椅子，桌子，以及紙板或棕櫚葉束，都可以在白天由Athens服務公司進行收集。若沒有提前預約，請不要把這些大件物品放置在路邊。請按照以下三個步驟來做：

- 在收集大件物品的前一天，請提前至少24小時，在營業時段裡，致電給Athens服務公司安排收集物品，電話：888-336-6100。
 - 請向Athens服務公司提供您的住址和相交街道名稱，收集日期，要搬走的物品清單。Athens服務公司可能會需要您提供額外指示說明。
 - 請在收集物品當天早上6點前，把大件物品放置在路邊。在收集您的大件物品的前一天24小時內，必須把物品放置在公共視野。為了保護兒童，請移除或關緊所有電器門。
- 請注意，南加州愛迪生電力公司(SCE)對仍在正常運作的舊冰箱和冷凍設備，目前正提供\$50元的折扣優惠。請撥打愛迪生客服熱線800-234-9722(TTY 800-352-8580)，諮詢更多相關詳情。
- 遵守這些指南將有助於保持蒙特利公園市街道清潔和安全。

No deje stos artculos en la calle sin antes llamar para hacer una cita. Siga stos tres pasos:

- Llamar a Athens Services al 888-336-6100 durante horas de trabajo por lo menos 24 horas antes de su prximo da de coleccin
- Darle a Athens Services su direccin y la calle que la cruza, el da que recogen su basura y una lista de los artculos que van a recogerse. Athens tambn puede darle instrucciones adicionales

- Poner afuera los artculos voluminosos que van a recogerse antes de las 6:00 a.m. su da de coleccin. Los artculos deben de ser guardados fuera de la vista pblica antes de 24 horas de su da de coleccin. Por favor quitar o asegurar las puertas de todos los aparatos electrodomsticos para proteger a los nios.

Por favor tome nota de que Southern California Edison (SCE) actualmente est ofreciendo un reembolso de \$50 por refrigeradores y congeladores viejos que todava estn funcionando. Pngase en contacto con Servicios al Cliente de SCE llamando al 800-234-9722, (TTY 800-352-8580) para ms informacin.

Siguiendo stos consejos ayudar a mantener las calles de Monterey Park limpias y seguras.
