October at the Farmers' Market

It's officially fall, and as the weather changes, so does the produce offerings at your local farmers' market. Every season has its bounty to share. Fall brings dense, nutrient and antioxidant-rich foods like onions, garlic, squash, turnips, sweet potatoes and carrots. In addition to being healthy, these foods are versatile as they are great roasted, in soup and stir-fry.

Farmers' Market Tip of the Month

A little garlic every day can go a long way in boosting your health. Additionally, adding garlic to your dish can add great flavor. Chef's tip: don't add garlic too early as it burns easily. The key is to add garlic midway through the recipe (exceptions: soups, sauces, long braises, etc) as there will be a bed of chopped onions and greens to cushion the garlic from the hot pan.

Monterey Park to Celebrate Centennial with Reflections, Dinner and Music October 22

Monterey Park will continue the celebration of its 100th birthday with a centennial dinner, titled "Reflections," and scheduled Saturday, October 22. It will feature music, dancing and art reflecting an extraordinary 100 years.

"It will be a delightful evening of great food, music, dance and fellowship with your neighbors and civic leaders," said Retired City Clerk Dave Barron, who is chair of the event.

"The Reflections Dinner will be a great follow-up to numerous activities, including the Play Days Festival, the Summer Concert Series and a special event at East L.A. College" said Co-chair Carol Sullivan.

The evening will feature a reception, a delicious beef buffet dinner, plus a sampling of foods reflecting the ethnic diversity of the community. Music, dancing and exhibits will reflect the changing years since the city was incorporated in 1916. A number of sponsors of the year long centennial celebration will be recognized at the dinner.

Reflections will be held at Langley Center, 400 West Emerson Avenue, and will begin at about 5 p.m. with a reception followed by dinner at 6:30 p.m.

Pet License and Vaccination Clinic October 15

The City of Monterey Park in conjunction with the Los Angeles County Animal Care and Control will hold a low-cost vaccination and licensing clinic for dogs on Saturday, October 15, 2016, 8-11 a.m., at Barnes Park 350 S. McPherrin Avenue.

The licensing for dogs in Monterey Park is mandatory and the license is valid for one year from the date of issue. While at the clinic, all dogs must have a collar and be on a leash or in a carrier.

These prices are valid only during the Monterey Park licensing and vaccination clinic.

Vaccination clinic price list:

- Rabies vaccine: \$7.00 (dogs 4 months and older)
- DHLPP vaccine: \$19.00 (dogs 8 weeks and older)
- Bordetella vaccine: \$14.00 (dogs 8 weeks and older)
- Deworming (price according to weight)
- FVRCP: \$18.00
- FELV: \$21.00
- Microchips: \$28.00 (includes lifetime registration)

Pet licenses may be purchased at the clinic after the pet is inoculated.

Annual (one year) pet license:

- Unaltered dog: \$40.00
- Altered dog: \$20.00 (with proof)
- Senior discount: \$7.50 (senior age is 60 years or older)

One dog per household and dog must be altered and have current rabies vaccination.



Founding Members of the Business Improvement District

Last month, the Cascades wrote about the genesis of the downtown Business Improvement District. This month, we bring you some background on the founding members: Doug Ball, Fred Hsieh, Johnny Thompson, John Weidner and Richard Kwok.

Doug Ball



Les, Vera and Doug Ball

Doug Ball, son of Pharmacist Les Ball, began his career at the Monterey Park Drug Store in 1966. In 1985, Ball was a founding member of the Downtown Merchants Association. Today this organization is known as BIDAC (Business Improvement District Advisory Council). Doug Ball was raised in a family with a long history of service to the people of Monterey Park. Les Ball was a past president of the Monterey Park

Lions Club. Both Les and son Doug are past presidents of the Monterey Park Chamber of Commerce.

Les Ball purchased a small drug store on the NW corner of Garvey and Garfield within 18 months of his graduation from the University of Southern California's School of Pharmacy. The date was November 1934 and the country was just pulling out of the depression. Many customers, through the generosity of Les Ball, ran up hefty bills for needed medicine. For many years the drug store served as the pharmacy for Garfield Hospital, filling more than 2.1 million prescriptions. Monterey Park Drug Store was also a community meeting place for thirsty teen-agers who bought cherry or chocolate coke from the soda fountain for a nickel.

Since 1934, Monterey Park Drug has employed more than 1,000 teenagers who were high school students when they began working at the store. The author's first job was at Monterey Park Drug, and pharmacists "Bunny" Wong, Karl Barnum and Les Ball were her supervisors while long time employees Betty Errickson (40 years of service), Fay Asdel (40 years) and Vickie Young (49 years) served as mentors. The comradeship among staff was something special.

It was necessary to raze the building during the early 1990s due to damage inflicted by the 1987 Whittier Narrows earthquake. Doug Ball took the lead in supervision of the demolition and rebuilding, which stretched over many months. His father was semi-retired at that time. Loyalty to their customers reigned supreme and staff worked out of temporary quarters in the parking lot during the months between the old store and new one. Their customers still needed prescriptions filled and management didn't let the absence of a building deter them from their task.

The drug store reopened; Les Ball passed away in 1995 and in 1996, Doug Ball found it necessary to sell the building after suffering a heart attack. Thanks to all staff at the Monterey Park Drug Store for 62 years of extraordinary service.

Frederic Hsieh

Frederic Hsieh moved to Monterey Park in 1972 and immediately came to the conclusion that this city would make a fine destination that could be chosen by immigrant Chinese as a gathering place. Mr. Hsieh was born in Giulin, China in 1945. His family moved to Hong Kong and, when Frederic was 18 years of age, he came to the United States, earning his citizenship in 1970. He earned a Bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering from Oregon State

University and a Master's degree in Water Resource Engineering, also from O.S.U. Subsequently, he went to real estate school and earned his license as a salesman.

When Hsieh moved to Monterey Park, there were still many lots full of overgrown grass on both Garfield Avenue and Atlantic Blvd. He had observed people making lengthy commutes to jobs in downtown Los Angeles when he lived in the Silverlake area and in Los Angeles' Chinatown. While walking to work, he had ample opportunity to observe congestion on the roads leading to Los Angeles. Monterey Park is so close to Chinatown and downtown Los Angeles that people could move to Monterey Park without the need for a lengthy commute.

Hsieh was active in Mandarin Realty, a business that concentrated efforts on real estate within the perimeter of the B.I.D. Hsieh envisioned

a different Monterey Park than the city he first set eyes upon in 1972 and then worked tirelessly to bring his vision to reality. He advertised Monterey Park land to potential immigrants still living in China and other countries in the Far East.

Johnny Thompson

"As a child I came with my brother and parents to Monterey Park in 1949. To this day, I still live and work in Monterey Park. I started giving guitar lessons locally while I was still in high school and I then graduated from Mark Keppel in 1961. Immediately thereafter, I opened Johnny Thompson Music, a retail store and school of music offering lessons, on north Garfield Ave and I received Monterey Park business license # 726. I

understand that licenses now number over 40,000 issued. In 1965, we moved to our current location on east Garvey Ave. In the 1980s, I was a founding member of the Downtown Merchants' Association, now known as the Garvey/Garfield Business Improvement District (BID). Also, about the same time we began to work closely with local school districts' music programs. However, in 2002, No Child Left Behind (NCLB) diminished and almost eliminated disadvantaged students' access to music education. In 2009, I started Parents for Music and Arts and established a .org website. In 2014, NCLB became Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Going forward, this new act shows great promise to reverse the 12 year decline of music and arts in our schools. We have an historical and informational website: johnnythompsonmusic.com that features numerous "community" sections. We also provide support, usually in the form of merchandise for silent auctions, to numerous local community organizations that support music such as the Alhambra Education Foundation (AEF) and the Alhambra Latino Association (ALA). Personally, I enjoy helping teachers tune their students' orchestral instruments for local concerts during the year." -Johnny Thompson.

John Weidner

You might have known him as Mr. Weidner, owner of Weidner's Nutrition located at 127 E. Garvey Ave. located here in Monterey Park. He and his wife Naomi moved to our town during the 1960s. The view of the San Gabriel Mountains, from their home near Garvey Ranch Park, reminded Mr. Weidner of the mountains he had loved during his childhood in Europe.

The Adventist Review of June 26, 2008 wrote, "Weidner was born into a Seventh-day Adventist home in Belgium in 1912. Because his father was a minister, the family was transferred frequently to new pastoral assignments. While the family lived in Switzerland, the law mandated that all children attend school every day of the week, including the Sabbath [Holy Day]. John's father wanted his children to attend church on the Sabbath and was told that the father would have to spend one day, each week, in jail if the children skipped school on the Sabbath. For seven years, I saw my father going every week to jail because of his religious convictions. As a little boy, that impressed me; the idea that if you believe something is right, you have to be able to accept the consequences of it. That helped me make my decision during the war. I wanted to help." By 1940, when Germany invaded France, Weidner was living in Lyon and soon came to help organize the Dutch-Paris underground network that eventually assisted about 800 Jews, 100 Allied aviators and many others to escape the tyranny and murder of Nazi oppression.

"In setting up an escape route, I tried to avoid the roads to find a passage from one side of the mountain to the other side, down the cliff. There, with the help of friends, we could watch during the night and then reach the border. We could avoid the guards, cut the barbed wire, and go into Switzerland. Not me alone. Along the escape line from Holland to Belgium to France to Switzerland, there were around 12 people working with us."

In addition to receiving the Medal of Freedom from the United States, Weidner was honored by Britain, the Netherlands, France, Belgium and Israel. John Weidner passed away in 1994, his widow, Naomi, still enjoys the view from her home in Monterey Park's hills.





A Guide to the Night Sky

Everything is constantly in motion. For example, this past summer Jupiter, Mars and Saturn ruled the evening skies, like beacons in the night, reminding us of our unique place in this vast, ever-expanding universe.

Now that we are well into autumn, it's fascinating to see just how much these steadily shining lights have wandered in such a relatively short span of time. Jupiter, which was high in the southwest just a few months ago, has wandered into our eastern pre-dawn skies, rising just before sunrise. Mars and Saturn are drifting further apart from each other, while Venus is slowly inching toward the quintessential ringed gas giant, low in our western sky just after sunset.

In fact by month's end, Venus will have also slipped beyond Saturn in its continual orbit around our nearest star, the Sun, and Saturn, like Jupiter, will eventually also wander into our eastern, pre-dawn skies.

All of this motion may seem somewhat dizzying to some degree, but there is an amazing comfort and

continuity to it all. For example, Earth's own natural satellite, the Moon, orbits our planet every 27.3 days. Every culture on planet Earth has used the Moon to measure time - our word month comes from moon. As the planets orbit the sun, we here on Earth see them slowly wander through our darkened skies - although if you know where to look, Venus is bright enough to be seen in daylight. In actuality, the planets are some of the brightest lights in the sky. Our ancestors noticed that these bright lights appeared to wander, while the stars appeared to remain "fixed". The word planet or planeta is Greek/Latin for wander. There are five wandering lights or planets you can see with the naked eye: Mercury, Venus, Mars, Saturn and Jupiter. These appear to us on Earth as bright stars, but with one exception - they don't twinkle like the stars do, rather they appear to be steady streams of light. There are also two other bright lights that wander through the sky; the Sun and the Moon. These seven lights that wander through the sky are the reason we have seven days of the week. If you know your Latin based languages, it's pretty easy to figure out which planet is which day.

On October 3 just after sunset, low in the west, look for the young crescent moon just above the brilliantly glowing Venus. On the evening of October 8, the first quarter or half moon will travel the night sky just above the pinkish colored Mars. And on the morning of the 27th, the waning crescent moon, barely visible as a thin sliver, will hang just above mighty Jupiter, low in our eastern, pre-dawn skies.

The monthly lunar cycles, the orbiting planets, the changing seasons all of this constant motion is incredibly comforting in so many ways. So take the time to simply look up, contemplate and enjoy this incredible spectacle for yourselves.

The Los Angeles Astronomical Society meets at Monterey Park's Garvey Ranch Observatory every Wednesday night, rain or shine, from 7-10 p.m. All members are eager to answer your questions and let you have a peek through our 8" telescope, weather permitting. 

Both of the iced teas available from the dispenser are sold for 69 cents if coupled with the purchase of a meal.



The menu is simple and Teshima is upfront about the simplicity. However, simplicity should not be taken as a less than worthy meal. His ingredients are fresh and the quality of the ingredients is evident. The great prices and variety at Sushi on Garfield are incentive to try this quaint restaurant out, the friendly service and generous portions of good food are reason be a repeat customer. 

Online Scheduling for Parent-Teaching Conferences at Repetto

This school year, parents are now using an online app called Calendly for scheduling purposes as well as keeping up with the school calendar. Most recently, the app was utilized for the scheduling of parent-teacher conferences, which proved to much more efficient than previous methods. Parents were invited via email by their child's teacher, to view the calendar and select an available appointment for each of their children. This new form of scheduling was widely accepted by both parents and teachers, who were able to coordinate their busy schedules quicker and easier while taking the responsibility of scheduling off the teachers and allowed parents the opportunity to select the dates for counseling that work for them.

Calendly works by each teacher sending out a link to all K-5 parents of their homeroom students. Parents with more than one child receive an email from all of their children's teachers. Parents then simply click on the link provided and select the day and times that are available and fit into their schedule. After scheduling a conference parents receive a confirmation via email. Reminders are sent to parents 1-2 days prior to the scheduled conferences.

Those parents who didn't have Internet access came to the school office to complete the task. If necessary, school community coordinators help work with parents online to schedule. Repetto staff felt the process was quite successful and look forward to continuing the online scheduling for next year.



Homeless and underprivileged students struggle to acquire the supplies we take for granted every day. A lack of basic necessities often renders these children unable to attend school, even though it is much safer for them to be in school than to stay at home. As a result, these students are forced to forgo their valuable schooling for days at a time, and may eventually drop out of school entirely. In response to this issue, Audrey Yang’s Girl Scout Gold Award Project, “Helping HOPE” is focused on bringing a sense of “hope” to the homeless and underprivileged students.

Audrey Yang is an Ambassador Girl Scout from Girl Scouts of Greater Los Angeles Council Troop 6101. This is her 10th year in Girl Scouting, and she is currently a junior at San Marino High School. Audrey has earned both Girl Scout Bronze and Silver Awards. She is an active volunteer in her community and is also a multiple year recipient of The President’s Volunteer Service Award at the Silver and Gold levels.

For her project, Audrey worked with the Alhambra Unified School District’s Gateway to Success program staff, Mrs. Betty Sodir, Homeless and Parent Engagement Counselor (HOPE) during the summer to create a mural and collect hygiene products for the HOPE room. The HOPE room was formed with the mission to support underprivileged students by providing them with school supplies, clothing, food, and hygiene products.

The purpose of the mural is to produce a welcoming environment for families visiting the HOPE room and to connect school, hopes and dreams, and Gateway to Success

together in a peaceful landscape. The mural includes rolling meadows between a school house and an apple tree. A path winds through the sweeping meadows toward a bright blue sky this signifying a path or a “gateway” to a bright future. The tree with an abundance of apples signifies the fruition of both students’ and educators’ hopes and dreams.

In addition to the mural, Audrey created flyers directed at her Girl Scout sisterhood and local communities asking them to help homeless students stay in school by donating much needed hygiene products such as basic toiletries, including soap, toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, and feminine napkins. These items were aimed to help students boost self-confidence, create positive self-images, and to bring smiles to their faces. Audrey was able to collect close to a thousand items, which was enough to supply the HOPE room with enough items for

the new school year. The collection effort was a success only due to the generosity and support of others.

Audrey is grateful to have received permission and support from Dr. Laurel Bear, Assistant Superintendent of Student/Employee Welfare to undertake my Gold Award project in Alhambra Unified School District. She is also thankful to have Mrs. Betty Sodir as her project advisor, Ms. Olga Velazquez-Rodriguez’s supervision and Ms. Monica Hernandez Morales’ support along the way.
