Earth Day Festival Brings Residents, Students and Organizations Together for Education and Fun

Earth Day Bike Rides

The Monterey Park Environmental Commission hosted the Earth Day Festival, Bike Rides, and Eco-Summit on April 21, 2018. The one day event was a collaboration between the Environmental Commission and Bike SGV for the bike rides event, and with the Planet Save for the Eco-Summit. The Earth Day Festival and Bike Rides are conducted to raise awareness on environmental issues related to the city and community of Monterey Park, such as drought, water conservation, energy savings, renewable energy, alternative transportation, waste reduction and recycling, stormwater pollution prevention, air quality, healthy food, healthy living habits, and environmental education for kids. It's also an opportunity to educate the residents as well as businesses in our community on the importance of preserving our natural resources to mitigate climate change. The theme for this year's event was focused on Monterey Park's being one of the Best Place to Live and to Raise Family in America.

More than 160 riders participated in the two bike rides: Hill Challenge Ride and the Family-Friendly Ride. The Hill Challenge Ride ran for about 14 miles through most of the high elevation areas around the city. The Family-Friendly Ride strolls through the lower elevation (flat surfaced) city streets for approximately

five miles. Both rides met at the historic El Encanto building (and home of the Greater Monterey Park Chamber of Commerce) for a rest stop and a quick tour of the landmark building.

As many as 25 environmental vendors participated in the Earth Day Festival which featured varieties of environmental topics and education for the public and the community of Monterey Park. These include our city utilities (San Gabriel Valley Municipal Water District, SoCalGas, and Edison), city haulers (Athens and Ware Disposal), city code enforcement staff, Metro Bike Hub, LA County Public Works, LA County Sanitation Districts, AQMD, Clean Rays Energy, Food Forward, Mark Keppel High School Science Club, and many other organizations.

The Earth Day Eco-Summit featured speakers and presentations from six environmental clubs and organizations such as Planet Save, UNICEF, PYA, Heal the Bay, Science National Honors Society, and Fluffy Butt. Each of the speakers presented their environmental topics and issues for the public during the event. Approximately 500 attendees-including individuals, parents and kids-came to the Earth Day Festival and Eco-Summit and visited the environmental booths with fun entertaining, educative games and giveaways during the event.

Fourth of July Fireworks Guidelines

"Safe and Sane" fireworks are the only permitted products allowed in the city and only on July 4 from 10 a.m.-10 p.m.

The City of Monterey Park allows the use of fireworks on the Fourth of July from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. only in the city; however, they are not allowed in city parks. Permitted fireworks must be "Safe and Sane" and cannot be modified or altered (MPMC 5.48.190).

Due to the extreme fire danger in California and to make sure everyone in the community can enjoy the holiday, the city encourages everyone to have a safe Fourth of July by ensuring the use of "Safe and Sane" fireworks only. Make sure children are supervised at all times when safe and sane fireworks are being discharged and also make sure to take care of your pets. At times, pets tend to be forgotten during the holiday. Due to pets' sensitivity to loud noises, fireworks can scare animals and cause them to run off. It is recommended to bring your pets indoors and play calming music while the fireworks are being ignited or seek the advice of your local veterinarian before the 4th.

The fire department's arson team and the police department will be patrolling the city to ensure safe preservation of the community. Citizens and visitors that fail to comply with the city's fireworks ordinance and are found with illegal fireworks, igniting illegal fireworks, allowing illegal fireworks to be discharged on their property or discharging safe and sane fireworks before July 4 may be susceptible to fines ranging from \$500 to \$1,000 and confiscation of the fireworks.

So enjoy the 4th of July, but remember to use Safe and Sane within the allowed times.

If you and your family would like to celebrate somewhere other than your home, join the City of Monterey Park at the 4th of July Celebration at Barnes Park, 350 S. McPherrin Avenue. 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Richard Garvey: The Name Behind One of California's Oldest School Districts

Richard Garvey was born in County Mayo in Ireland in 1838. He immigrated to this country in 1850 at the age of 12. Garvey fell in love with the rolling hills adjacent to the Midwick Country Club when he was hired to carry army mail from Los Angeles to Ft. Mojave on the Colorado River prior to the Civil War. An article in the Progress dated May 29, 1947 relates this period in Richard Garvey's life. "Receiving the mail at Wilmington, I usually crossed the Los Angeles River at what is now known as Macy Street. In stormy weather I was sometimes delayed on account of the difficulty of fording the stream with my animals and mail, as no bridges had been built. To reach El Monte there was the choice of several routes, the shortest of which led due east through the hills to the present location of the Midwick Club and continued due east." Richard Garvey married Theresa Mooney in 1884, who died at the young age of 22, leaving one son, Richard Garvey, Jr.


In 1890 there were approximately fifteen children living in the area that is now the Garvey School District; however there was no school in existence at that time. Richard Garvey, Sr., visited the County Board of Supervisors at this time and requested the organization of a school district for educational purposes. He later contributed land for the first school.

During 1892-94, while awaiting action on the petition, a teacher was provided for the local children. Classes were held in the granary on the Garvey Ranch, somewhere near the present corner of New and Garvey Avenues. A district was officially formed on March 30, 1894. Work began almost immediately on a two room structure on the grounds donated by Garvey at the corner of Garvey and Hellman (now Jackson).

In 1900-1901, the yearly salary for the teacher was \$412.50 at a rate of \$50 per month. Enrollment grew and so did salaries. In 1908-1909 the monthly salary jumped to a whopping \$75 per month.

The district continued to grow and schools were added:

When the district moved to the intermediate configuration, Fern School was divided into two facilities—Fern Intermediate and Fern Elementary.

In 1989, Fern Intermediate School was renamed for Roger Temple, a long time teacher, principal and superintendent who passed away that same year. Later, Fern Elementary was renamed after George I. Sanchez, well-known sociologist and writer who was a leading reformer of bilingual education.

Much work was done following the 1933 earthquake and in 1937 the old Garvey building was removed and the new one completed.

The years 1950, 1954 and 1956 were outstanding years in the establishment of five new buildings on the Richard Garvey campus. Richard Garvey, Jr., generously donated funds for the Richard Garvey Sr., Memorial Auditorium located at the corner of Garvey and Jackson.

The little school district that began with 15 students and one classroom has grown to over 7,000 students in two intermediate and eleven elementary schools. The Garvey School District is the second oldest district in the State of California. The South Pasadena School District was begun in 1886.

The Garvey family was generous with their donations of land and money to this area and since there are no heirs, the Board of Directors of the Historical Society of Monterey Park have elected to underwrite the cost for restoring the Garvey Mausoleum located in Calvary Cemetery in Los Angeles. This project is a means of demonstrating respect for Richard Garvey, Sr., and his family.

The Historical Museum of Monterey Park is open each Saturday and Sunday afternoon between the hours of 2-4 p.m. It is located adjacent to the observatory in Garvey Ranch Park at 781 S Orange Ave, Monterey Park, CA 91754. Volunteers are available to answer questions and explain exhibits.

Guide to the Night Sky

It's June. That means it's also time for our annual summer solstice, which marks the beginning of summer in the Northern Hemisphere. Let's dive a little deeper into this amazing yet relatively common event.

Earth spins on its axis with one complete turn taking approximately 24 hours in what we call a "day." Well, this axis just happens to be tilted, coincidentally, about 24 degrees (makes it easy to remember). Earth also orbits the nearest star, the Sun. As the tilted Earth orbits the Sun, there are times when the top half of Earth (the Northern Hemisphere) is leaning away from the Sun while the bottom half (the Southern Hemisphere) is leaning towards the Sun. Conversely, there will be a time six months later when Earth will be in a place in its orbit where the bottom half will be leaning away from the Sun, while the top half will be leaning towards the Sun.

June 21 at 3:07 a.m. will be this time. While most of us don't have the resources to travel long distances out into space and witness this event for ourselves, it definitely translates visually down here on Earth. For example, at dawn on June 21, the Sun will rise at its furthest northern point on the eastern horizon. During the day, the Sun's path will also be at its northernmost path or highest in the sky, and at sunset, the Sun will set at its most northern point on the western horizon.

Keep in mind that the Sun has been gradually moving northward since the winter solstice and, after June 21, will reverse direction, but this is a gradual transition. As the Sun gets closer to its most northern point, its movement begins to slow down and, from our vantage point, appears to stop or "stand still" before turning around and heading south again. The word "solstice" is derived from the Latin sol (sun) and sistere (to stand still). From this point on, the days gradually begin to get shorter, becoming somewhat noticeable near the end of July, beginning of August.

June's full moon is known as the Strawberry Moon, since this moon signaled the time when Algonquin tribes would gather ripening strawberries and other fruit. This year, the Full Strawberry Moon happens at 9:54 p.m. on June 27. Another interesting happening is that the full moon rises and travels the sky with the mighty Saturn. Look for Saturn, appearing as a rather average looking, non-twinkling star just to the lower right of the full moon on this night only.

Early in the month on June 3, the Moon will rise with the planet Mars (both in Capricornus, The Sea Goat), but not until 1:00 a.m. Jupiter (in Libra, The Scales) is high in the southeast at sunset early on in the month, while Saturn (in Sagittarius) rises around 11:00 p.m. Mid month on June 17, try to find an extremely thin crescent moon to the left of planet Venus, both just above the western horizon. By month's end though, Jupiter will have moved westward and appears high in the south at sunset, Saturn rises around 9:00 p.m. and Mars appears above the eastern horizon just prior to midnight.

Have a great month and take some time to pause and look up. There's an incredible show going on overhead each and every night.

The Los Angeles Astronomical Society meets at Monterey Park's Garvey Ranch Observatory every Wednesday night, rain or shine, from 7-10 p.m. All members are eager to answer your questions and let you have a peek through our 8" telescope, weather permitting. 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
How Much Sales and Property Taxes Come Back to Monterey Park



A delicious chicken wing seems pretty straightforward to make — a chicken wing, deep fried and marinated with a sauce to flavor. Chicken wings fans have been known to travel long distances in search of great crispy flavored wings. For Monterey Park residents, Running Chicks offers Korean inspired deep fried chicken wings.

Owner Donald Tsai has figured out a deep fry method to cook the wings and created the right sauce options to flavor them. Running Chicks offers three distinct flavors to satisfy your wing cravings including soy garlic, lemon pepper and sweet spicy. Tsai spent a great deal of time experimenting to come up with the right blends for each of these sauces. The most popular is the soy garlic flavor, which is a custom mix of soy sauce, brown sugar and garlic. The reduction soy garlic sauce takes 1½ hours to prepare and the results are a mouth watering sauce layered on crunchy fried wings.

The idea of fresh ingredients for a restaurant that operates like a fast food franchise is hard to believe yet Running Chicks prides itself by providing fresh ingredients in all their food. The restaurant uses non-frozen chicken for their wings; prepared in-house and using only fresh produce. Running Chicks offers five

side dishes including fries (regular or garlic butter), cole slaw, potato salad, rice and pickled radish. For customers interested in fresh greens to go along with their wings, bibimbap is on the menu. Bibimbap is a Korean rice bowl that includes meat and seasoned veggies with gochujang red chile paste.

Another essential aspect for Running Chicks' business model is convenience. Their condensed menu is specifically tailored to expedite orders promptly, so customers do not wait long. Even the fries are cut thin so that they can be fried quickly. Although Running Chicks does not deliver, they have contracted with food delivery applications, such as UberEats and Postmates to handle and expedite deliveries. Tsai, a Taiwan native, left the corporate life to start his own business. The main reason he started his business in Monterey Park is because he lives in the city, and was advised that your first business should be 5-10 minutes from where you live. He also saw a need for a fast-food style business on North Atlantic and jumped at a leasing opportunity when one opened in Mar Center.



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Too Much Sugar: Diabetes and Gum Disease

We know too much sugar can cause cavities. So, it is not surprising that too much glucose, also called sugar in your blood from diabetes can cause pain, infection, and other problems in your mouth, according to the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases. Glucose is present in your saliva—the fluid in your mouth that makes it wet. When diabetes is not controlled, high glucose levels in your saliva help harmful bacteria grow. These bacteria combine with food to form a soft, sticky film called plaque. Plaque also comes from eating foods that contain sugars or starches. Some types of plaque cause tooth decay or cavities. Other types of plaque cause gum disease and bad breath. Therefore, diabetics who are not careful in controlling sugar intake are more prone to cavities as well as gum disease,

Emerging research also suggests that the relationship between serious gum disease and diabetes is two-way, according to the American Diabetic Association. Not only are people with diabetes more susceptible to serious gum disease, especially when blood glucose is high, but serious gum disease may have the potential to affect blood glucose control and contribute to the progression of diabetes. Research suggests that people with diabetes are at higher risk for oral health problems, such as gingivitis (an early stage of gum disease) and periodontitis (serious gum disease). People with diabetes are at an increased risk for serious gum disease because they are generally more susceptible to bacterial infection and have a decreased ability to fight bacteria that invade the gums.

It can be said that overconsumption of sugar may be a major cause of two of the most prevalent diseases in the world, i.e., gum disease and diabetes.

National surveys have found that the average American consumes around 85 grams of sugar every day. According to the new USDA guidelines, we should really be eating a fraction of that amount. The recommended sugar intake for adult women is 22 grams of sugar per day, for adult men, it's 36 grams daily, and for children, it's 12 grams a day.

Over time, consistently taking in more sugar will lead to insulin disease, otherwise known as diabetes. What's alarming is that many people do not realize they are on the road to diabetes. This epidemic of "on the way to diabetes" is called prediabetes. Type 2 diabetes doesn't appear suddenly and the slow, long and invisible road there is "prediabetes," which is where blood sugar levels are consistently higher than normal over a long time slowly affecting insulin signaling.

So, overconsumption of sugar leads not only to cavities and gum disease, but also can predispose you to prediabetes and even diabetes.

In summary, cut down on the sugar intake. Be regular in your home dental care as well as your visits to your dentist.

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
