How You Vote Will Be Changing Beginning with the March 2020 Election


District elections and LA County modernization will bring change to the voting process.

Monterey Park Elections Will Be Conducted Under By-District Elections.

On May 1, 2019, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2160 changing from at-large to by-district elections, establishing boundaries, and sequencing of elections within the districts.

Beginning March 2020, voters will experience district voting for the first time. Only voters within said districts will be eligible to vote for candidates vying to represent their respective district. Candidates for City Council must reside within the respective district they are running for. For the March 2020 Election and every 4 years thereafter, only voters in Districts 2, 3 and 4 will be voting for candidate within their district. In 2022 and every 4 years thereafter, voters in Districts 1 and 5 will vote under the same procedures as described. The elected positions of City Treasurer and City Clerk will remain at-large and will be voted on in March 2022 and every 4 years thereafter. The term of office for all City elected positions will remain four years. All voters will vote for City's ballot measures in the election it was proposed.

County of Los Angeles Is Modernizing the Voting Experience by 2020.

- The new voting experience is designed to be intuitive and accessible for all voters. Innovative changes give all voters regardless of age, background, disability or language a private and independent voting experience that is easy and convenient.
- Los Angeles County will transition from polling places to vote centers. Convenient, secure and accessible Vote Centers will be available for 11 days and same day voter registration is allowed on site. Voters can vote at any vote center throughout the County with full language services and expanded accessibility.
- The Ballot Marking Device (BMD) makes it easy for voters to customize the voting experience to fit their needs. Voters can adjust settings on the BMD including user interface contrast, text size, screen angle, and audio volume and speed.
- Vote by mail ballot has been redesigned making it easier and more convenient to vote by mail. Voters will receive a full face ballot which is easier to read, fill out and

understand. Ballots are available in 12 languages. Vote by mail ballots can be dropped off at a Vote by Mail Drop Box Locations available for 29 days and no postage is necessary if mailed via USPS.

Monterey Park City Council Opposes State Housing Bills That Strip Local Control

Officials say proposed legislation would bring negative impacts and prevent enforcement of building and safety codes

The Monterey Park City Council opposes pending housing bills before the California legislature affecting the city's ability to regulate land use. If passed, these bills will significantly increase residential development in the city without citizens having a voice in the process. The council encourages residents to express their concerns to the authors of the legislation.

Some of the local consequences of the bills would be:

- Adverse economic and service impacts to cities and competing/inconsistent laws.
- Overcrowding and health and safety concerns.
- Investor ownership incentives with no affordability requirement.
- Reduced parking while mass transit ridership is decreasing.

The City of Monterey Park encourages citizens to voice their concerns to the authors of the legislation. The bills are:

- SB-330 (Skinner)-Housing Crisis Act of 2019. Would only require .5 parking spaces for each unit.

- AB-1279 (Bloom)-Planning and zoning: housing development: high-resource areas. This legislation would provide for housing by right, even on property not zoned for residential purposes, based upon it being located near certain defined mass transit areas.
- AB-1763 (Chiu)-Planning and zoning: density bonuses: affordable housing. AB 1763 will create inconsistent development patterns in the residential areas by allowing no limits on density and building heights triple the height of what is typical in a residential area.
- AB-68 (Ting)-Land use: accessory dwelling units. AB 68 proposes to allow multiple accessory dwelling units (ADUs) within an existing structure. There are concerns about the long-term monitoring of these ADUs and the lack of oversight. There are no protections in place to keep one tenant from subleasing to multiple other tenants and inadvertently creating slum conditions.
- AB-881 (Bloom)-Accessory dwelling units. Provides that cities cannot consider whether or not their existing water and sewer services are adequate to serve the new units.



The legislation presupposes that all people in California want to live in communities that are homogenous and indistinguishable from other communities. This is clearly not the case, given how cities have developed throughout the history of California. Otherwise, all cities would have been developed in this manner. Some people want to live in rural or suburban areas with more open space, others want to live in more urban environments, while others want a mixture of these different types of living environments. While the city understands that not everyone has the ability to live where they want to live, many do. This legislation proposes to adversely affect the quality of life for most people and deny them the right to determine what type of community they want to live in.

The city clearly understands the need for more housing, but there needs to be more flexibility in the proposed legislations or allow cities a little more time to show the progress and results of the existing legislations.

For these reasons, the City of Monterey Park opposes SB-13, SB-330, AB-68, AB-1279, AB-1763 and AB-881. With this said, the city would welcome a process whereby local councils of government are required to provide the state Senate and Assembly with real and constructive input as to how to achieve building more residential housing with a particular emphasis on affordable housing. This would be a much more respectful and constructive manner to deal with local government and housing issues.

Monterey Park Fire Department Disaster Preparedness Guide and Community Training Helps Residents Prepare for Emergencies


With some of the recent incidents that have occurred in California, the Monterey Park Fire Department felt it necessary to put together a document to ensure our residents are prepared should one of these incidents occur. The intent of the Disaster Preparedness Guide is not to alarm but rather to empower. Now is the time to prepare for any type of event by completing simple tasks such as developing an escape plan for your home, building an emergency supply kit, and reducing brush near or around your home if you live in a potential brush fire area. It's also important when developing a plan to make sure you exercise the plan so all in your family are familiar with it. As the saying goes, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." Planning for an incident such as an earthquake will help prevent some of the tragedies that we see all too often on the news in the aftermath of an earthquake.

If an event such as a large-scale earthquake were to hit our area, services such as natural gas, electricity and water might be off for hours, days or possibly weeks. Services such as the fire department and police department could also possibly be delayed as

a result of increased call responses. This is why your self reliance is so important.

Putting together your emergency home kit with items such as food, water and medications is so very critical to not only your comfort but quite possibly your survival. Learning basic first aid and CPR is also a very useful and important skill. Take advantage of the free Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training classes offered by the fire department. These skills are not only important during an emergency event but also in daily life. By preparing your home and your family for any type of event, you will be ready, organized and confident.

Monterey Park Animal License Field Enforcement Begins September 18

Dogs and cats are required to be licensed and microchipped in the City of Monterey Park

Officers from the Los Angeles County Department of Animal Care and Control (LACDACC) will be conducting field licensing enforcement in the City of Monterey Park beginning Wednesday, September 18, 2019.

Dogs and cats are required to be licensed and microchipped in the City of Monterey Park. Field enforcement is designed to ensure Monterey Park residents' dogs and cats are in compliance with mandatory licensing requirements. California State law requires that all dogs over the age of four months be both vaccinated against rabies and licensed. Beginning January 1, 2014, puppies may be vaccinated at three months old, but are not required to be vaccinated until four months of age. Securing a dog or cat license is essential to assisting animal control agencies if a pet becomes lost.

The licensing fees for Monterey Park residents are as follows:

- Unaltered dog \$60.
- Altered dog \$20.
- Altered dog belonging to a senior citizen (60+) \$7.50.
- Altered dog belonging to a military veteran with disabilities \$7.50.
- Unaltered cat \$10 (mandatory registration).

- Altered cat \$5 (mandatory registration).
- Penalty fee (equal to the license fee).

Pet owners are advised to be in compliance with the city's licensing ordinance. Residents not in compliance will be subject to license fees and delinquency charges, including a \$40 field enforcement fee, to offset the cost of the department's field services. In order to avoid penalties, be sure to license your dogs and cats. You can secure a new license by printing the application online at <https://animalcare.lacounty.gov/licensing/>, or by visiting your local county animal care center. If your license is not delinquent, you can also renew on line.

There are six Los Angeles County Animal Care Centers: Downey, Baldwin Park, Carson, Castaic, Lancaster and Agoura Hills, plus the Antelope Valley Adoption Center in Lancaster.

Census Bureau to Begin Data Collection Monterey Park

Now through October, Monterey Park residents can expect to see Census address canvassers going house to house to verify addresses as a prelude to the 2020 Census

The next census will take place on April 1, 2020. The United States Constitution mandates that a complete population count be conducted every 10 years. In an effort to provide a more accurate count for the 2020 Census, the City of Monterey Park has launched a public awareness outreach campaign. The City will play an active role in mobilizing community members and City staff to educate local residents and stakeholders about the need to participate in the census and complete the questionnaire. For the first time, the public will be able to respond online, by phone, as well as by mail. The outcome of the 2020 Census will shape the City of Monterey Park for the next ten years. Census Takers in My Neighborhood

Now through October, you may begin to notice census takers in your neighborhood. This is a normal part of the 2020 Census preparation and data collection process.

Why Does the Census Bureau Do This?

You might see census takers in your neighborhood for a few different reasons:

- Verifying addresses in preparation for the census.
- Collecting responses to the census or another survey.
- Dropping off census materials.
- Conducting quality checks on the census.

Census takers who verify addresses are called address canvassers. They help ensure an accurate and complete count by verifying address lists across a wide area of physical geography, housing structures, and residence types. Part of this effort involves census takers on the ground noting where houses, apartments, shelters, and other residences are located. Census takers will attempt to knock on every door in the neighborhood they are canvassing.

How Can I Verify the Identity of a Census Worker?

If you are visited by someone from the U.S. Census Bureau, here are some tips to assure the validity of the field representative:

- Census takers must present an ID badge that includes a photograph of the field representative, a Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date.
- Note that census workers may be carrying a Census Bureau phone or a laptop as well as a bag with a Census Bureau logo.

Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling (MORe)


Effective April 1, 2016, Assembly Bill 1826 requires organics recycling services for certain commercial properties and multi-family dwellings of five or more units that generate large quantities of waste. (Note: multi-family dwellings are not required to arrange for source separated food waste collection under this law.)

Key Implementation Dates:

- April 1, 2016: Businesses that generate eight cubic yards of organic waste per week must arrange for organic waste recycling services.
- January 1, 2017: Businesses that generate four cubic yards of organic waste per week must arrange for organic waste recycling services.
- January 1, 2019: Businesses that generate four cubic yards or more of commercial solid waste per week shall arrange for organic waste recycling services.
- January 1, 2020: California's Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) must determine if organics waste disposal has been reduced by at least 50%. If it has not, CalRecycle is authorized to reduce the threshold for compliance to two cubic yards per week of total solid waste.

City of Monterey Park 2019-20 Budget at a Glance

After a lengthy process that involved the Monterey Park City Council seeking further clarification to justify specific budget requests, the council unanimously approved the city's 2019-20 spending plan on June 19. The budget is based on the city's three-year citywide goals and continues to focus on maintaining excellent community services, funding much needed city infrastructure and capital improvements, and enhancing organizational efficiency. The spending plan includes \$110.1 million for all funds with the general fund appropriations totaling \$45.2 million. The capital budget is \$8.7 million to enhance the city's capital and infrastructure improvements.

The general fund is the main operating fund of the city and it pays for most of the police, fire, building, zoning, public works, park maintenance, recreation, and library services. The development of the Monterey Park Market Place, which is the largest commercial shopping center ever developed in the community, continues adding more stores to the site. The 2019-20 general fund revenue includes anticipated additional sales tax receipts from the Market Place and ½ year opening from the Marriott Hotel.

City staffing for 2019-20 is 367.18 full time equivalent positions (FTEs). As with most public agencies, personnel

costs are the city's single largest operating expenditure. The adopted budget reflects MOU adjustments for police and fire units and the mandate state minimum wage increases for part-time personnel in January 2020. The city is currently negotiating with the remaining six bargaining units, whose contracts have expired.

It has been the city's goal to reduce its total current and future pension and other retirement benefits liabilities. At the budget process, the city council approved the continuous pension cost pre-payment option, appropriated additional funds, and starting the pension contribution sharing process with safety members to pay down unfunded liabilities.

Looking ahead to 2019-20, the city affirms its commitment to sound and conservative financial practices to ensure adequate service delivery, specifically effective water management, for all residents. The city manager thanks the city council for their leadership and the citizens for your support in directing the financial affairs of the city in a most responsible and progressive manner. Night Sky Report

Since June, evening starts earlier and earlier. Jupiter is setting fast in the southwest, and Saturn is as high as it gets in the south. The typical summer constellations are setting in the western half of the sky, while those of autumn are rising in the east. On September 23 is the autumnal equinox.

The Moon begins the month as a very thin crescent in the evening skies. It ends the month as a thin crescent in the morning skies. The lunar phases are: first quarter September 6, full moon September 14, last quarter September 21, and new moon September 28.

As we approach the autumnal equinox, the nights get longer and the days shorter. This is because the Earth is past the summer solstice, when the Earth's rotational axis is pointed as much towards the Sun as possible. That axis always points at the same position in the sky, towards Polaris the North Star, but as the earth revolves around the Sun, that axis alternatively tilts towards the Sun, then away from it, then back again in a 12 month cycle. Equinox is Latin, ancient Italian if you will, for equal (equi-) nights (-nox). On September 23 of this year, days and nights are of equal length, 12 hours each, hence the name.

It's always hard to see constellations from urban locations, but 1st mag stars can be seen. Two of the brightest shine overhead, Vega and less brightly to the south, Altair. Science fiction movie buffs will recognize the latter from "Forbidden Planet." Yes, that Altair. Deneb is fainter than the other two, but should be visible to the east of Vega. These three stars form the Summer Triangle. Vega is within the constellation Lyra the Harp, Altair is in Aquila the Eagle and Deneb is in Cygnus the Swan.

Jupiter is still putting on a show, but it's setting in the west as evening starts, so get your views of it while you can. Next month it'll pretty much be gone for the next six months from our evening skies. There are no significant Jovian moon events this month, because Jupiter can only be observed for a few hours each evening.

Saturn is as high as it will get as evening starts, so once again, get your views of it while you can. It's towards the south and should be the brightest star in that portion of the sky, although a quick comparison reveals it's a lot fainter than Jupiter. Binoculars and low power telescopes

will show that Saturn is definitely oval in shape, not round, but you'll need magnifications around 100x or more to see the rings distinctly. Despite being just about everyone's favorite planet, Saturn is small. With the rings it's about as large as Jupiter. Without, about half Jupiter's size, 45 times smaller than the Moon. The image below was taken on August 8, 2018 from the public star party held at Griffith Observatory using my 7-inch aperture 105 inch focal length Maksutov telescope with a Celestron NexImage video camera. The magnification is about 400x.



You might see the black line separating the inner from the outer rings, called Cassini's division after the Italian astronomer who first saw them clearly. Banding on the planet's disk can be seen. There's the shadow of the planet on the rings, seen on the rings where they pass behind Saturn. There's also the shadow of the rings on the planet, where the rings cross in front of Saturn's disk.

Even a small scope can see Saturn's brightest moon, Titan, as a faint star near the ringed planet, but the others will require more aperture (width) and magnification to make out. Unlike Jupiter, Saturn does not have any bright moons.

The Los Angeles Astronomical Society, also known as the LAAS, operates Monterey Park's Garvey Ranch Park Observatory. The observatory is located just off the east parking lot. It's open to the public every Wednesday night from 7-10 p.m. An 8-inch 9-foot refracting telescope is available to look through, weather permitting. People often set up their own telescopes out on the lawn beside the observatory. There's a telescope-making workshop on the ground floor, and LAAS members are ready to provide advice and knowledge on all things astronomical. Everything is free of charge. If you have any questions on equipment, observing, or just want a peek through a telescope, drop on by. 從2020年3月的選舉開始， 你如何投票將會有改變

蒙特利公園市的選舉將劃分成區域式進行投票。

2019年5月1日，市議會通過了第2160號法令，從一般選舉改為區域性選舉，建立邊界線，並對各區域內的選舉進行排序。

從2020年3月開始，選民將首次體驗地區性的投票。只有在所述地區內的選民才有資格投票給代表各自地區的候選人。市議會的候選人必須居住在他們所競爭的相應區域內。對於2020年3月的選舉，投票之後的每4年再選舉投票一次，只有第2,3和4區域的選民才可以投票選出他們所在地區的候選人。在2022年的選舉，投票之後的每4年再選舉投票一次，第1區和第5區的選民將按照所述的相同程序進行投票。市府財務長和市府書記的當選職位將保持和之前一樣，並將在2022年3月的選舉，投票之後的每4年再選舉投票一次。所有城市選舉職位的任期將保持四年。所有選民都在選舉中將提議過的立法提案投票。

洛杉磯縣會在2020年前將投票經驗提升更現代化。

- 新投票經驗為所有選民提供直覺和更簡易操作的服務。創新的變化使所有選民無論年齡、背景、殘疾或語言，都能獲得簡易、方便、私人空間和獨立投票經驗。
- 洛杉磯縣將從投票點轉為到投票中心。方便、安全和容易操作的投票中心將為大眾提供服務11天，也允許同一天辦選民登記服務。選民可以在整個縣的任何投票中心投票，提供全面化的語言服務和更簡易操作服務。
- 選票標記設備 (BMD) 使選民可以輕鬆的設定投票設備來滿足他們的需求。選民可以調整BMD上的設置，包括畫面的對比度、字體大小、屏幕角度、音量和速度。

Las elecciones Distritales y la modernización del Condado de Los Angeles traerán cambios al proceso electoral

Las Elecciones de Monterey Park se Llevarán a Cabo Bajo las Elecciones Por Distrito.

El 1ro de Mayo del 2019, el Concejo Municipal adoptó la Ordenanza No. 2160 que cambia de elecciones en general a elecciones por distrito, estableciendo límites, y la secuencia de elecciones dentro de los distritos.

A partir de Marzo del 2020, los electores tendrán la experiencia de la votación por distrito por primera vez. Sólo los electores dentro de dichos distritos serán elegibles para votar por candidatos compitiendo para representar a sus respectivos distritos. Los candidatos para el Concejo Municipal deben de residir dentro del respectivo distrito para el que están postulando. Para las elecciones de Marzo del 2020 y cada 4 años de allí en adelante, sólo los votantes en los Distritos 2, 3 y 4 votarán por el candidato dentro de su distrito. En el 2022 y cada 4 años a partir de entonces, sólo los votantes en los Distritos 1 y 5 votarán bajo los mismos procedimientos que se han descrito. Los cargos electos de Tesorero Municipal y Secretario Municipal permanecerán libres y se votarán por ellos en Marzo del 2022 y cada 4 años de allí en adelante. El término de todos los cargos electos de la Ciudad permanecerá de cuatro años. Todos los electores votarán por las medidas de votación de la Ciudad en la elección que se propuso.

El Condado de Los Angeles está Modernizando la Experiencia Electoral para el 2020.

- La nueva experiencia de votación está designada para ser intuitiva y accesible para todos los electores. Los cambios innovadores les brinda a los electores, sin tener en cuenta la edad, antecedentes, discapacidad o idioma, una experiencia electoral privada e independiente que es fácil y conveniente.
- El Condado de Los Angeles hará el cambio de los lugares de votación a los centros electorales. Convenientes, seguros y accesibles los Centros Electorales estarán disponibles por 11 días y se permitirá el registro electoral el mismo día en el sitio. Los electores pueden votar en cualquier centro electoral en todo el Condado con servicios de idiomas completos y mayor accesibilidad.
- El Dispositivo que Marca las Balotas (BMD) facilita a los electores personalizar la experiencia de votación de acuerdo a sus necesidades. 蒙特利公園市議會反對州議院的法案將剝奪地方城市的控制權

有關官員表示，擬議立法規將會帶來負面影響，並阻礙建築和安全法規的執行

蒙特利公園市議會反對正在加州立法機構的待決住房法案，這將會影響改變該市土地管理使用。如果通過，這些法案將會增加城市的住宅開發，但是居民在此過程中沒有任何發言權。蒙市議會鼓勵居民向立法機構的作者發出聲明表達出他們的意願。

這議會法案將會造成的一些後果是：

- 對城市的經濟不利和影響服務品質以及競爭/不一致的法律。
- 過度擁擠以及健康和安全性問題。
- 給投資者激勵措施提案，但沒有負擔能力的要求。
- 減少停車，而公共交通乘客容量將會減少。

蒙特利公園市政府鼓勵居民向立法機構的作者發出聲明表達出他們的意願。議會法案是：

- SB-330 (Skinner) - 2019年的“住房危機法”。每個單元只需要.5個停車位。
- AB-1279 (Bloom) - 規劃和分區：住房開發：資源豐富的住房區域。該機構將通過立法權限來提供住房，即使是在沒有劃為住宅用途的區域，就因為它位於某些公共交通區域附近。
- AB-1763 (Chiu) - 規劃和分區：建築密度高度限制獎勵：經濟上可負擔的住宅。
- AB1763將在居住區域產生不一致的開發建築模式，不允許對密度和建築高度進行設計限制，使住宅區的典型高度增加三倍。
- AB-68 (Ting) - 土地使用：附屬住宅單位。AB 68建議在現有結構內，允許多個附屬住宅單位 (ADUs)。人們擔心由於這些ADU的長期監控以及缺乏監督。沒有任何保護措施可以防止一個租戶再轉租給其他多個租戶並無意中造成貧民窟狀況的現象。
- AB-881 (Bloom) - 附屬於原住宅居住單位。規定市政府不能考量以現有的供水量和下水道服務是否有足夠的條件來供應給新單位提供服務。

該立法機構假設加州所有人都希望生活在與其他社區相同建築的住宅而無法分辨出區別的社區裏。考慮到整個加州歷史的城市發展，情況顯然不是這樣。否則，所有城市都將以這種方式發展。有些人希望生活在鄉村或郊區，擁有更多的開放空間，有些人希望生活在城市環境中，而其他人則想要生活在兩種類型都有的環境中。雖然市政機構了解，並非每個人都有能力居住在他們想要居住的環境，但還是有許多人能做到。該立法提議將對大多數人的生活質量產生不利影響，並拒絕他們有權決定他們想要居住的社區類型。

該市明確了解更多住房的需求必要性，但擬議的立法需要更多的靈活性，或讓地方政府有更多的時間來採用現有立法去進展再觀察結果。

出於這些原因，蒙特利公園市反對議會法案SB-13，SB-330，AB-68，AB-1279，AB-1763和AB-881。有鑑於此，該市將歡迎一個程序，要求地方政府理事會向州參議院和議會反應提供相關於如何建設更多住宅房屋，特別是經濟適用房的實際和建設性意見。對於處理當地政府和住房問題，這將是一種能夠可獲得更加尊重和建設性的方式。

El Concejo Municipal de Monterey Park se Opone a Proyectos de Ley de Vivienda Estatales Que Despojan el Control Local

Los funcionarios dicen que la legislación propuesta generaría impactos negativos y evitaría la aplicación de los códigos de construcción y seguridad.

El Concejo Municipal de Monterey Park se opone a los proyectos de ley de vivienda pendientes ante la legislatura de California que afectan la capacidad de la ciudad para regular el uso del terreno. Si son aprobados, estos proyectos de ley aumentarán significativamente el desarrollo residencial en la ciudad sin que los ciudadanos tengan voz en el proceso. El concejo alienta a los residentes a expresar sus preocupaciones a los autores de la legislación.

Algunas de las consecuencias locales de los proyectos de ley serían:

- Impactos económicos y de servicio adversos para ciudades y leyes que compiten y que son inconsistentes.
- Apilamiento y problemas de salud y seguridad.
- Incentivos de propiedad para los inversionistas sin requisitos de asequibilidad.
- Reducción de estacionamiento mientras disminuye el número de pasajeros en transporte público.

La Ciudad de Monterey Park alienta a los ciudadanos a expresar sus preocupaciones a los autores de la legislación. Los proyectos de ley son:

- SB-330 (Skinner)-Ley de Crisis de Vivienda del 2019. Sólo se requieren .5 espacios de estacionamiento para cada unidad.
- AB-1279 (Bloom)-Planificación y zonificación: desarrollo de viviendas: áreas de altos recursos. Esta legislación proveería viviendas por derecho, aun en propiedades no zonificadas para fines residenciales, basada en que estén ubicadas cerca de ciertas áreas definidas de transporte público.
- AB-1763 (Chiu)-Planificación y zonificación: bonos de densidad: vivienda asequible. AB 1763 creará normas de desarrollo inconsistentes en las áreas residenciales al no permitir límites de densidad y que la alturas de construcción tripliquen la altura de lo que es típico en un área residencial.
- AB-68 (Ting)-Uso del terreno: unidades de vivienda secundarias. AB 68 propone permitir múltiples unidades de viviendas secundarias (ADUs) dentro de una estructura existente. Existen preocupaciones sobre el monitoreo a largo plazo de estas unidades y la falta de supervisión. No hay protecciones en orden para evitar que un inquilino subarrende a varios otros inquilinos y que cause inadvertidamente condiciones de barrios bajos.
- AB-881 (Bloom)-Unidades de vivienda secundarias. Estipula que las ciudades no pueden estimar si sus servicios de agua y alcantarillados existentes son adecuados para abastecer a las nuevas unidades.

La legislación supone de antemano que toda la gente en California quiere vivir en comunidades que son homogéneas e indistinguibles de otras comunidades. Claramente, éste no es el caso, dado cómo las ciudades se han desarrollado a lo largo de la historia de California. De lo contrario, todas las ciudades se habrían desarrollado de esta manera. Algunas personas quieren vivir en áreas rurales o suburbanas con más espacio abierto, otras quieren vivir en ambientes más urbanos, mientras que otras quieren una mezcla de estos diferentes tipos de ambientes de vida. Si bien la ciudad entiende que no todos tienen la capacidad de vivir donde ellos quieren vivir, muchos lo hacen. Esta legislación propone afectar negativamente la calidad de vida de la mayoría de las personas y negarles el derecho a determinar en qué tipo de comunidad quieren vivir.

La ciudad entiende claramente la necesidad de más viviendas, pero tiene que haber más flexibilidad en las legislaciones propuestas o darles a las ciudades un poco más de tiempo para mostrar el progreso y los resultados de las legislaciones existentes.

Por estas razones, la Ciudad de Monterey Park se opone a SB-13, SB-330, AB-68, AB-1279, AB-1763 y AB-881. Dicho esto, la ciudad recibiría con agrado un proceso según el cual los concejos de gobiernos locales deben de proporcionar al Senado y a la Asamblea del estado información real y constructiva sobre cómo lograr construir más viviendas residenciales con un énfasis particular en viviendas asequibles. Esta sería una manera mucho más respetuosa y constructiva de tratar con el gobierno local y los problemas de viviendas.


蒙特利公園消防局 災害準備指南和社區培訓協助居民 為緊急情況預先做好準備

鑒於最近在加州發生的一些事件，我們認為有必要整理一份文件，以確保您在蒙特利公園市發生類似事件時先做好準備。《備災指南》的目的不是讓您感到恐慌，而是為了增強您的能力。現在是時候完成一些簡單的任務，為不同類型的事件預先做好準備了，例如為您的家庭制定一個逃生計畫，建立一個應急供應包，如果您住在一個潛在的灌木叢火災區域，減少您家附近或周圍的灌木叢。在制定計畫時與您的家人一起進行練習，確保所有家庭成員都熟悉逃生計畫，這一點很重要。俗話說，“一分預防勝於十分治療”。對地震等事件進行應對規劃，將有助於避免經常發生在地震後新聞中看到的類似悲劇。

當若有諸如大地震這樣的事件襲擊我們的地區，天然氣瓦斯、電力和水等供應可能會中斷數小時、數天，甚至數周。其它公共服務例如消防隊和警察局也可能因電話回應增加而延遲回應。這就是為什麼你的自救能力是如此重要。把你的急救箱和食物、水、藥物等放在一起，這不僅對你的舒適感非常重要，而且很可能對你的生存也非常重要。學習基本急救和心肺復蘇也是一項非常有用和重要的技能。利用消防局提供的免費社區應急小組（CERT）培訓課程。這些技能不僅在緊急事件中很重要，而且在日常生活中也很重要。為突發事件提前做好預案，當情況發生時，您和您的家人將會有信心、有條不紊的做好應對。

La Guía de Preparación para Desastres del Departamento de Bomberos de Monterey Park y el Entrenamiento Comunitario Ayudan a los Residentes a Prepararse para Emergencias

Debido a algunos de los incidentes recientes que han ocurrido en California, el Departamento de Bomberos de Monterey Park consideró necesario crear un documento para asegurarse que nuestros residentes estén preparados en caso de que ocurra uno de estos incidentes. La intención de la Guía de Preparación para Desastres no es alarmar sino más bien habilitarlos. Ahora es el momento de prepararse para cualquier tipo de evento completando tareas simples como desarrollar un plan de escape para su hogar, construyendo una caja de provisiones de emergencia y reduciendo la maleza cerca o alrededor de su casa, si usted vive en un área con posibilidad de incendios de maleza. También es importante cuando desarrollan un plan, asegurarse de que practiquen el plan para que todos en su familia se familiaricen con él. Como dice el dicho, “Una onza de prevención vale una libra de cura.” Planificar para un incidente como un terremoto ayudará a prevenir algunas de las tragedias que vemos con mucha frecuencia en las noticias después de un terremoto.

Si un evento tal como un terremoto de gran escala ocurriera en nuestra área, los servicios como el gas natural, la electricidad y el agua podrían estar desconectados por horas, días o posiblemente semanas. Los servicios tales como el Departamento de Bomberos y el Departamento de Policía también podrían ser demorados posiblemente como resultado del aumento de respuestas a las llamadas. Es por eso que su autosuficiencia es tan importante.

Preparar el paquete de emergencia para su hogar con artículos como alimentos, agua y medicamentos es muy importante no sólo para su comodidad pero muy posiblemente para su supervivencia. Aprender primeros auxilios básicos y RCP es también una habilidad muy útil e importante. Aproveche las clases de entrenamiento gratuitas del Equipo de Respuesta a Emergencias Comunitarias (CERT) ofrecidas por el Departamento de Bomberos. Estas habilidades no sólo son importantes durante un evento de emergencia sino también en la vida diaria. Al preparar su hogar y su familia para cualquier tipo de evento, estará listo, organizado y confiado.

El uso obligatorio en área abierta es diseñado para asegurar que los perros y gatos de los residentes de Monterey Park cumplan con los requisitos de licencias obligatorias. La ley del Estado de California requiere que todos los perros mayores de cuatro meses sean vacunados contra la rabia y que tengan licencia. Empezando el 1ro de Enero del 2014, los cachorros pueden ser vacunados a los tres meses de edad, pero no es requerido que sean vacunados hasta los cuatro meses de edad. Obtener una licencia para perro o gato es esencial para ayudar a las agencias de control de animales si una mascota se pierde.

Las tarifas de licencias para los residentes de Monterey Park son las siguientes:

- Perro inalterado \$60.
- Perro alterado \$20.
- Perro alterado que pertenece a una persona mayor (60+) \$7.50.
- Perro alterado que pertenece a un veterano militar con discapacidades \$7.50.
- Gato inalterado \$10 (registro obligatorio).
- Gato alterado \$5 (registro obligatorio).
- Multa (igual a la tarifa de licencia).

Se les recomienda a los dueños de mascotas que cumplan con la ordenanza de licencias de la ciudad. Los residentes que no cumplan estarán sujetos a tarifas de licencia y cargos de retraso, incluyendo una tarifa de \$40 por aplicación en área abierta, para compensar el costo de los servicios de área abierta del departamento. Para evitar las multas, asegúrese de que sus perros y gatos tienen licencias. Usted puede obtener una nueva licencia imprimiendo la solicitud en línea en <https://animalcare.lacounty.gov/licensing/>, o visitando el centro local de cuidado de animales del condado. Si su licencia no está retrasada, usted también puede renovarla en línea.

Hay seis Centros de Cuidado de Animales del Condado de Los Angeles: Downey, Baldwin Park, Carson, Castaic, Lancaster y Agoura Hills, además del Centro de Adopción de Antelope Valley en Lancaster.

蒙特利公園市將於9月18日開始外出 執行動物執照法律規定

在蒙特利公園市的狗和貓必須要獲取執照和植入微芯片

洛杉磯縣動物保護和控制部（LACDACC）的官員將於2019年9月18日星期三開始在蒙特利公園市進行實地執法。

在蒙特利公園市的狗和貓必須要獲取執照和植入微芯片。實地執法工作人員要確保蒙特利公園市居民的狗和貓符合強制性的執照要求。加州法律要求所有超過四個月大的狗都接種狂犬病疫苗並獲得執照。從2014年1月1日開始，幼犬可能在3個月大時接種疫苗，但在4個月之前不需要接種疫苗。如果寵物走丟失了，狗或貓的執照是個至關重要的文件，並將協助動物管理機構找尋主人。

蒙特利公園居民的寵物執照費如下：

- 未絕育的狗60美元。
- 絕育的狗20美元。
- 屬於耆英年長者，絕育過的狗（60歲以上）7.50美元。
- 屬於殘疾退伍軍人，絕育的狗7.50美元。
- 未絕育過的貓10美元（強制註冊）。
- 絕育過貓5美元（強制註冊）。
- 罰款（相當於執照許可費用）。

建議寵物主人務必遵守該市的執照條例。不遵守法律規定的居民將需要繳納執照許可費、拖欠費，包括40美元的法規執行費，以抵消該部門實地服務的費用。為了避免處罰，請務必去申辦您的狗和貓的執照。您可以通過<https://animalcare.lacounty.gov/licensing/>在線打印應用程序，或參訪當地的縣動物護保中心來獲取新執照許可證。

如果您的執照許可證沒有拖欠過期，您也可以在网上續訂。洛杉磯縣有六個動物保護中心地點：Downey, Baldwin Park, Carson, Castaic, Lancaster and Agoura Hills, 以及 Antelope Valley Adoption Center in Lancaster。
