**IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE
BY NORMAN LIEBERMAN, CITY ATTORNEY**

This proposal would authorize the City Council of the City of Monterey Park to assess, for two years only, standby charges on properties within the City for police protection services.

The assessment may not exceed in any one year the amount previously stated in a notice mailed to each property owner. The actual assessment may be reduced each year, but it may not be increased.

The maximum amount that may be raised by such assessment against all of the parcels of property in the City is \$505,000 per year. The proceeds of the assessments will be placed in a Special Account to pay for police protection services.

Expenditure limitations imposed by Article XIII B (California Constitution) will be increased \$505,000 for 1981-82 and 1982-83 so that the additional funds may be used for police protection services.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF PROPOSITION B

Crime has increased beyond our Police Department's ability to handle it. The skyrocketing crime wave in our City can be stopped if voters will vote YES on Proposition B.

A YES vote on Proposition B will add more police to stop the rise in crime.

We have a good Police Department but in the last ten years the number of Police Officers has only risen six percent while the major crime has gone up one hundred and seventy-five percent.

Those of us who have always supported our police know of the great job they have done but now they need our help. Other cities in Los Angeles County do not have the united support of community leaders, citizens, and police working together to stop the crime wave.

The Monterey Park City Council and the Concerned Citizens for a Safe Monterey Park urge everyone to vote YES on Proposition B so we can stop talking about this crime menace and take a step in the right direction to make our City a safer place to live.

NO ARGUMENT AGAINST THIS MEASURE WAS SUBMITTED

ORDINANCE NO. 1538

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MONTEREY PARK DETERMINING, PROPOSING FOR ADOPTION AND ASSESSING STANDBY CHARGES FOR POLICE PROTECTION SERVICES FOR FISCAL YEARS 1981 - 82 AND 1982 - 83

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MONTEREY PARK DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council of the City of Monterey Park has initiated proceedings pursuant to the provisions of Article 16 (Section 53970 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code of the State of California for the purpose of determining, proposing for adoption and assessing standby or availability charges for police protection services.

SECTION 2. The City Council has caused to be prepared and filed with the City Clerk a report in writing containing the matters specified in Section 53974 of the Government Code (the "Report"), which was filed with the City Clerk on February 6, 1981.

SECTION 3. The City Council on January 26, 1981, preliminarily approved the Report and fixed Monday, February 23, 1981, at 7:30 P.M. in the City Council Chambers as the date, time and place for hearing on the Report and protests and objections thereto.

SECTION 4. The City Council hereby finds that notice of the filing of the Report, of the time, date and place of the hearing thereon, and of the amount of the charges proposed to be assessed against each parcel of property was published, posted or mailed in the form and manner required by law.

SECTION 5. The City Council hereby further finds that all proceedings have been conducted pursuant to Government Code Section 53970 et seq.

SECTION 6. The City Council hereby determines that each of the standby charges for police protection shall be as set forth in the Report, a copy of which is on file in the office of the City Clerk and incorporated herein by this reference as though set forth at length.

SECTION 7. The City Council hereby finds and determines that the amount of the standby charges as determined and hereinafter assessed and police protection for which such charges are hereinafter assessed are reasonable in amount relating to the City and are reasonable in amount relating to each parcel, improvement or use of property charged.

SECTION 8. The standby charges for police protection as determined herein are hereby assessed and proposed for adoption by the voters of the City for fiscal years 1981-1982 and 1982-1983 unless modified as provided in Sections 9 or 10 hereof. This Ordinance shall be submitted to the voters of the City, and this Ordinance and the charges determined, proposed and assessed herein shall take effect upon approval of two-thirds of the voters voting upon this Ordinance.

SECTION 9. If approved by the requisite number of voters, the charges determined, proposed and assessed herein shall be levied in the same amount for 1981-1982 and 1982-1983 unless amended or superseded by a new ordinance adopted pursuant to the provisions of Article 16 (commencing with Section 53970) of Chapter 4 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code, or until repealed pursuant to an ordinance adopted by the City Council, provided, however, that for any fiscal year the City Council may, by resolution or minute order, reduce the aggregate amount of the standby charges for police protection. In the event that such charges are reduced in accordance with the provisions hereof, then the amount of such charges for each lot or parcel for such fiscal year shall be reduced proportionately. A reduction in the aggregate amount of such charges for any fiscal year shall not prevent the City Council, by resolution, from increasing the aggregate amount of such charges for subsequent fiscal years, but in no event shall the charges be increased above the amount contained in the Report.

SECTION 10. For fiscal years 1981-82 and 1982-83, the City Council may, after notice and a hearing, uniformly redetermine the amount of the charges determined, proposed and assessed herein with respect to lots or parcels within the City to account for new construction or improvements to existing uses of property. Any such redetermination shall be computed in accordance with the formula set forth in the Report and in no event shall the charge be increased for any parcel which has not been improved or resold during the previous fiscal year.

Prior to redetermining the standby charges for police protection, the City Council shall cause a written report to be prepared and filed with the City Clerk which shall contain a description of each lot or parcel of property subject to a proposed increase in charges, the redetermined amount of each of such charges for each such lot or parcel for such fiscal year, the basis of each such charge, and a schedule of each of such charges.

The City Clerk shall cause notice of the filing of the report and a time, date and place for hearing thereon to be posted in at least three (3) public places in the City and published pursuant to Section 6066 of the Government Code. Such notice shall also be mailed at least two (2) weeks prior to the hearing to those owners who appear from the last County equalized assessment roll, or last State Board of Equalization assessment roll, to be the owners of a lot or parcel for which such charges are proposed to be increased.

At the time, date and place stated in the notice, the City Council shall conduct a public hearing on the report and the redetermined charges proposed therein. The hearing may be continued from time to time. At the conclusion of the hearing, the City Council may adopt, revise, change, reduce or modify each or any standby charges as redetermined.

SECTION 11. If approved by the requisite number of voters, the charges determined, proposed and assessed herein shall be collected by the Los Angeles County Tax Collector in the same manner and subject to the same penalties as other charges and taxes collected on behalf of the City. The City recognizes that certain costs will be associated with collecting such charges and the City agrees that such reasonable costs as are actually incurred may be deducted by the County of Los Angeles prior to remitting the balance of charges collected to the City Treasury.

SECTION 12. If any section, part, clause or phrase in this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or entity or any charge or charges determined, proposed and assessed herein is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining portions of the ordinance, application thereof, or charge or charges shall not be affected but shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 13. The City Clerk of the City of Monterey Park shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and to its approval by the Mayor and shall cause the same to be published in the Monterey Park Progress, a newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in the City of Monterey Park.

ORDINANCE NO. 1539

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MONTEREY PARK INCREASING THE APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT IMPOSED BY ARTICLE XIII B TO PAY FOR POLICE PROTECTION

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF MONTEREY PARK DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The appropriations limits imposed upon the City of Monterey Park by Article XIII B of the California Constitution are hereby increased by the amount of \$505,000 as proposed in Ordinance No. 1538 for the purposes and uses set forth therein for fiscal year 1981-82 and fiscal year 1982-83 and then terminate.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance if passed by a majority of the voters on June 2, 1981.

CHARTER AMENDMENT 6

Title:

Filling Vacancies in Board of Education Offices

The Issue:

Should the Charter be changed to reduce the length of time that an office on the Board of Education can be held by a person who has been appointed to fill a vacancy?

The Situation:

The members of the Board of Education are each elected to serve four year terms. The City holds regular elections for some of these offices every two years.

If a Board office becomes vacant before the end of a regular four year term, the Board can either appoint someone to fill the vacancy, or they can ask the City to hold a special election. Whether elected or appointed, the person filling the vacancy would serve the rest of the term.

The Proposal:

This measure would continue to allow the Board of Education to fill vacancies on the Board either by appointment or by special election. If a vacancy is filled by special election, the person elected would still serve the rest of the term.

However, if the vacancy is filled by appointment, the person appointed would only serve until the next regular Board of Education elections. At those elections, a successor to the office would be elected.

If the office would normally be filled at the next regular elections, the person appointed would serve all of the rest of the term and no special election would be held.

Argument For:

No one should hold an elective office for almost four years without the voters having a say in the matter. However, that can now happen under the Charter because the Board of Education can fill a vacancy with a political appointment. This gives the voters no voice in choosing who fills the vacancy. Charter Amendment 6 is an easy and economical way to give the voters back their voice.

This Amendment would make sure that any political appointee would only serve until the next regular City election. At that election, the voters would elect someone to fill the office. This means no appointee could serve longer than two years. This election would be held with regular City elections. As a result, there would be no extra cost to the taxpayers for such a special election.

The present law gives others the power to decide who will represent the voters. Charter Amendment 6 will return that power to the voters where it belongs.

Argument Against:

A YES Vote Means:

You want the Charter changed to reduce the time that an elective City office can be held by a person appointed to fill a vacancy.

A NO Vote Means:

You do not want this change made in the Charter.

6 FILLING VACANCIES IN ELECTIVE SCHOOL BOARD OFFICES. CHARTER AMENDMENT 6.

Shall Section 271 be added to the Los Angeles City Charter to provide that vacancies in the office of Members of the Board of Education be filled either by election to the unexpired term or by appointment until the next June 30 of an odd numbered year, unless the appointment is made after the first date fixed by law for a candidate to file a declaration of intention to become a candidate at the next regular City nominating election, in which case the appointment would be to fill the entire unexpired term?

**IMPARTIAL SUMMARY OF MEASURE
BY KEN SPIKER, CHIEF LEGISLATIVE ANALYST**

Charter Sections 267 and 268.5 regulate the manner in which vacancies on the Board of Education of the Los Angeles Unified School District may be filled. Under current law, the Board of Education may fill a vacant office of Member of the Board of Education either by appointment or by asking the City Council to hold a special election for that purpose. In either case, the person so elected or appointed serves the remainder of the unexpired term, regardless of the length of time remaining in the term.

This amendment would add a new Section 271 to the Charter. This new Section would restate the current procedures relative to filling vacancies on the Board of Education and add a new requirement affecting only appointees to the Board. Under this new requirement, a person appointed to fill a vacant Board of Education office would only serve until the next June 30 of an odd-numbered year following the appointment. The Board would have to hold a special election to fill the remaining two years of the unexpired term. That special election would have to be consolidated with the next regular City Primary and General elections occurring after the appointment.

The only instances in which a special election would not be held following such an appointment are:

- if the appointment is made after the first day to file a declaration to run for office at those next regular City elections, or
- if the office involved would normally be up for election at the next regular City elections.

In those instances, the person appointed would serve all of the unexpired term.

**ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF PROPOSED
CHARTER AMENDMENT 6**

No elected official should hold office for nearly four years without ever having to face the voters. Yet, that's exactly what's happening today. The City Council or the School Board can—and has—filled a vacancy with a political appointment without the voters having any say in the matter.

Charter Amendment 6 is an easy and economical way to give the voters back their voice. Municipal elections are held every two years. Half the members of the School Board and the City Council are selected in one election, the other half face the voters two years later.

Charter Amendment 6 would simply require that a political appointee to fill a vacancy would come before the voters at the first possible city election. This would ensure that no appointee would serve longer than two years without facing an election. And, because the election would be combined with an existing election, there would be virtually no additional cost to the taxpayers.

Here's an example: Bob Smith is elected to the School Board in this election. Then, a month or two after he takes office, Smith resigns. The School Board—by today's rules—can appoint a replacement who will serve almost four full years. The voters will have nothing to say about it. Charter Amendment 6 would require that the seat be up for election as soon as possible. That way, the voters aren't stuck for four years with a political appointee who is not answerable to them.

The current system of filling vacancies allows the power brokers to decide who will represent you. Charter Amendment 6 will change that and return the power to the voters . . . where it belongs.

PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT 6

Section 271 is hereby added to the Charter of the City of Los Angeles to read as follows:

Sec. 271. Filling Vacancies in the Office of Members of the Board of Education.

A. Notwithstanding the provisions of Sections 267 and 268.5 of this Charter, vacancies in the office of Members of the Board of Education shall be filled by either appointment or election in the manner set forth in this section.

B. The Board of Education may fill a vacancy by appointing a person to hold the office for the portion of the unexpired term remaining through the next June 30 of an odd numbered year. If, however, the vacancy is filled after the first date fixed by law for filing a declaration of intention to become a candidate at the next primary nominating election, the person appointed shall hold the office for the remainder of the unexpired term.

C. Instead of filling a vacancy by appointment, the Board of Education may contract with the City of Los Angeles for the calling and conducting of a special election or elections for the purpose of filling such vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term. Such contract shall be subject to approval by the City Council, and shall contain a provision that the Los Angeles Unified School District shall pay for all costs incurred in conducting the special election or elections. Unless otherwise specified in the contract, within 30 days of the City Council's approval of the contract for calling and conducting a special election pursuant to this section, the Council shall adopt an ordinance calling a special election for the purpose of filling such vacancy and provide in such ordinance the time for holding the election; whether consolidation with any other scheduled election will be sought; the procedures for nominating candidates, including the amount of the filing fee, if any, to be paid by candidates; and other matters pertaining to such election. If no candidate at such special election receives a majority of the votes cast therein, the City Council shall call another special election by ordinance for the purpose of determining who shall be elected to the office as between the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes at the prior election. The time for holding such election and in any other matter pertaining to such election shall be provided for in such ordinance. The votes at any such special election shall be canvassed and the results thereof declared in the same manner provided by law as in a regular election.

D. In the event the Board of Education fills a vacancy by appointment, it shall, except as provided in Subsection B, also contract with the City of Los Angeles for the calling and conducting of a special election or elections to fill the remainder of the unexpired term, if any, as set forth in Subsection C, and the City Council shall consolidate such election or elections with the primary nominating election and the general municipal election next succeeding the appointment.

E. No person shall be appointed or elected to fill a vacancy who does not possess the necessary qualifications for election to the office of Member of the Board of Education. Any person appointed or elected to fill a vacancy may be removed from office by the recall in the same manner as if he or she had otherwise been elected to said office.
