

• TO VOTE FOR PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES

AMERICAN INDEPENDENT, GREEN, LIBERTARIAN, NATURAL LAW AND PEACE & FREEDOM PARTIES

- To vote for a candidate for nomination for President, fill in the circle next to the candidate's name. Your vote in this portion of the ballot is advisory only.

No presidential candidates have qualified to be placed on the ballot for the Natural Law Party.

DEMOCRATIC PARTY

- To vote for delegates pledged to a candidate whose name appears on the ballot, fill in the circle next to the name of the candidate preferred.

REPUBLICAN PARTY

- To vote for a candidate whose name appears on the ballot, fill in the circle next to the candidates name.

NONPARTISAN VOTERS

- Due to changes in state law, non-partisan voters may choose to vote for Democratic, Republican, or American Independent candidates. See inside for more details.

TO VOTE FOR A PERSON NOT LISTED ON BALLOT:

(Write-In Votes are valid for qualified candidates only.)

- Write qualified write-in candidate's office title and name in the blank space provided inside the secrecy sleeve.

TO VOTE FOR A MEASURE

- Fill in circle next to YES or NO.
- Do **not** vote both YES and NO. This will result in an overvote and your vote on that measure will not count.

NEW VOTING SYSTEM

INKaVOTE IS HERE!

New InkaVote Voting System

Voters will see a new voting system, **InkaVote**, for the 2004 elections.

WHAT IS INKAVOTE? An optical scan voting system that is remarkably similar to the familiar punch card voting system that voters in Los Angeles County have used to cast their ballots for the past 35 years.

WHY CHANGE FROM PUNCH CARD SYSTEM? A 2002 federal court ruling required California counties to replace punch card systems by the March 2004 Primary Election.

HOW DOES INKAVOTE WORK? Instead of using a punching device to dislodge chad, the voter marks the ballot card using an ink marker to fill in the circles associated with the candidates/ballot measures. The ballot card is the same size as the former punch card ballot. (See instructions on inside cover of this sample ballot booklet).


Electronic Touchscreen Voting

Los Angeles County plans to transition to an electronic touchscreen voting system at all 5,000 voting locations in the future when funding becomes available. Until then, all of Los Angeles County's 4 million registered voters have the option of casting an electronic ballot on touchscreen machines during the "early" voting period in advance of major elections. For the March 2, 2004 Primary Election, 16 locations have been established for touchscreen voting from February 18-27 (locations listed on the following pages).

55	KINDERGARTEN-UNIVERSITY PUBLIC EDUCATION FACILITIES BOND ACT OF 2004. This twelve billion three hundred million dollar (\$12,300,000,000) bond issue will provide funding for necessary education facilities to relieve overcrowding and to repair older schools. Funds will be targeted to areas of the greatest need and must be spent according to strict accountability measures: Funds will also be used to upgrade and build new classrooms in the California Community Colleges, the California State University, and the University of California, to provide adequate higher education facilities to accommodate the growing student enrollment. These bonds may be used only for eligible projects. Fiscal Impact: State costs of about \$24.7 billion to pay off both the principal (\$12.3 billion) and interest (\$12.4 billion) costs on the bonds. State Propositions – information and arguments are contained in the 8 ½ X 11" State Pamphlet which is mailed to registered voters by the Secretary of State.

DOES MY VOTE REALLY COUNT?

YES, IT DOES!

However, IT IS IMPORTANT FOR VOTERS after voting by mail or at the polling place to:

1. Make sure circles are filled so your vote will count.
2. Review voted ballot carefully for any *overvotes* or *undervotes*.

An "*overvote*" occurs when a voter casts votes for more candidates than the number of candidates to be elected for an office; or casts both a "yes" and a "no" vote for a ballot measure.

An "*undervote*" occurs when a voter does not cast a vote for a specific office or ballot measure contest. Also, when multiple votes are permitted (such as a "vote for no more than three") and a voter casts votes for less than the maximum number allowed.

Overvotes and/or undervotes do not result in rejection of the entire ballot nor affect the votes cast for other offices and ballot measures.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE V

At its December 3, 2003 meeting, the City Council decided to submit to the voters Measure V which would impose a special fire/police protection tax on properties in the City of Monterey Park in the amounts set forth in the table below. The special tax would pay for services, wages, medical benefits and retirement enhancements. The City Council stated that the purpose of these additional funds is to bring the City's sworn police and fire personnel into parity with the wages and benefits offer similar sworn personnel in other San Gabriel Valley cities.

If at least two-thirds (2/3) of the voters approve Measure V, a special annual parcel tax will be established and the monies collected shall be deposited in a special fund to be used by the City only as provided above. Property owners will pay the amounts shown below beginning with the 2004/2005 property tax year. Each year the City Council may levy the parcel tax up to the maximum amount. The term of the special parcel tax is twenty-five years. Measure V states that it is the intent and purpose that this special tax supplement, not replace, the City's current general fund budget appropriation for the fire and police departments. Measure V exempts property owners from the fire/police protection tax who (i) are religious, charitable or community service organizations which qualify for other tax exemptions, (ii) are low-income, or (iii) qualify for the City's utility user's life line program. Further, the special tax to be imposed on any property owner over the age of 65 years will be 50% of the amount set forth in the table below.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE OF MEASURE V

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF MONTEREY PARK, CALIFORNIA, ADDING CHAPTER 3.44, ENTITLED FIRE/POLICE PROTECTION SPECIAL TAX TO THE MONTEREY PARK MUNICIPAL CODE

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF MONTEREY PARK, CALIFORNIA ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The People hereby amend the Monterey Park Municipal Code (MPMC) to establish a Fire/Police Protection Special Tax, by adding Chapter 3.44 thereto, to read as follows:

Chapter 3.44

Fire/Police Protection Special Tax

Sections:

- 3.44.010 Short title.
- 3.44.020 Definitions.
- 3.44.030 Exemptions.
- 3.44.040 Special Tax.
- 3.44.050 Purpose.
- 3.44.060 Special Fund.
- 3.44.070 Tax rate; contingency.
- 3.44.080 Annual report.
- 3.44.090 Term.
- 3.44.100 Adjustments and refunds.
- 3.44.110 Amendments.
- 3.44.120 Severability.
- 3.44.130 Effective date.

3.44.010 Short title.

The Chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Monterey Park Fire/Police Protection Special Tax Ordinance."

3.44.020 Definitions.

The following words and phrases whenever used in this chapter shall be construed and defined in this section:

- (a) "Condominium project" means a condominium, a community apartment project, or a stock cooperative, all as defined in Section 1351 of the Civil Code.
- (b) "Dwelling unit" shall have the same meaning as Section 21.04.245.

(c) "Maintenance and operating costs" of providing fire/police suppression services means all reasonable and necessary costs expended or incurred by the city for maintaining and operating the Monterey Park Fire and Police Departments, calculated in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles including, but not limited to:

(1) Obtaining, furnishing, operating, and maintaining fire suppression equipment or apparatus, paying the salaries and benefits to firefighting personnel, and such other necessary fire protection expenses.

(2) Obtaining, furnishing, operating, and maintaining police equipment or apparatus, paying the salaries and benefits to police personnel, and such other necessary police protection expenses.

(3) But shall not be construed to mean costs to provide support services to the Monterey Park Fire or Police Departments by any other department of the city or for costs of major capital improvements.

(d) "Single-family residential" shall have the same meaning as Section 21.04.235 Dwelling, Single Family.

3.44.030 Exemptions.

(a) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as imposing a tax upon any person when imposition of such tax upon that person would be in violation of either the Constitution of the United States or the Constitution of the State of California.

(b) The tax imposed by this chapter shall not be levied upon the federal government, the state government, any state agency, or any local governmental agency.

(c) The tax imposed by this chapter shall not be levied upon a parcel of property, which is owned by a house of worship or charitable, or community service organization, which qualifies for an exemption from ad valorem taxation under California Law.

(d) The tax imposed by this chapter shall not be levied upon any owner if such owner receives a low income/life line exemption pursuant to Resolution No. 9663 from the utility user's tax imposed by Chapter 3.38 of this Municipal Code.

(e) The tax imposed by this chapter shall not be levied upon any owner who has income, adjusted for family size, at or below eighty percent of the area median income as determined upon the Section 8 Income Limits for Los Angeles County as published by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and applicable to the Community Development Block Grants Programs.

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PROPOSED ORDINANCE OF MEASURE V (Continued)

(f) The tax imposed by this chapter shall be reduced by 50% upon any owner over the age of 65 years.

3.44.040 Special Tax.

(a) There is imposed a special tax on each residential dwelling unit and nonresidential parcel within the City of Monterey Park for the purpose set forth in this chapter at the rate specified herein.

(b) This tax is enacted under the authority of Sections 50075-50077.5 and 53970-53979 of the California Government Code.

3.44.050 Purpose

(a) The purpose of this special tax is to provide funds to the City to pay for services, wages, medical benefits and retirement enhancements.

(b) The intent and purpose of this special tax is to supplement, not replace, the City's general fund budget appropriation for fire and police departments. The special tax funds are to be used for the above purposes and the City should not reduce its current level of funding for Fire/Police protection services as a consequence of the additional funding provided by this special tax.

(c) The City Council may provide for the collection of the special tax in the same manner and subject to the same penalties as, or with, other charges and taxes fixed and collected by the City, or by the County of Los Angeles on behalf of the City. If the special tax is collected by the County on behalf of the City, the County may deduct its reasonable costs incurred in such service.

(d) City costs of enforcement and administration of tax, including refunds, shall be paid from the special tax revenue.

3.44.060 Special Fund.

(a) There is hereby established a special fund entitled, "Fire/Police Protection Special Tax Fund" (hereafter the "special fund"). Revenue collected pursuant to this chapter shall be deposited into said special fund and shall be used exclusively as provided in this chapter for the purposes for which the tax is imposed, and for no other purposes. Nothing in this section shall prevent disbursements from this special fund to reimburse the general fund if, and only if, money has been advanced from the general fund to pay for the uses provided for in this chapter. Advancement as used in this section shall mean only those general funds necessary to pay for services or goods authorized by this chapter but for which insufficient funds have yet to be collected in the special fund due to cycle of collection.

(b) Any money raised by the special tax, including any interest accrued thereon, that remains unencumbered at the end of any fiscal year may be used in succeeding fiscal years for only the purposes stated in this chapter.

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PROPOSED ORDINANCE OF MEASURE V (Continued)

3.44.070 Tax rate; contingency.

(a) An annual special tax is hereby levied on the following classification of property in the City:

- (1) \$ 70.00 on each single family residential dwelling unit or each dwelling unit in a residential condominium project.
- (2) \$ 150.00 on each parcel improved with two residential units, which is not a condominium project.
- (3) \$ 300.00 on each parcel improved with three to five units residential units, which is not a condominium project.
- (4) \$ 550.00 on each parcel improved with six to 10 units residential units, which is not a condominium project.
- (5) \$1,000.00 on each parcel improved with eleven or more residential units, which is not a condominium project.
- (6) \$ 200.00 on each parcel which is 0.14 acres or less and improved with a non-residential building.
- (7) \$ 400.00 on each parcel, which is more than 0.14 acres to 0.5 acres and improved with a non-residential building.
- (8) \$ 700.00 on each parcel, which is more than 0.5 acres to 1.0 acre and improved with a non-residential building.
- (9) \$1,500.00 on each parcel, which is more than 1.0 acre and improved with a non-residential building.
- (10) \$ 70.00 on vacant parcel.

(b) The special tax rates may be increased pursuant to the consumer price index (CPI) prepared by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Government for all urban consumers for the Los Angeles Anaheim-Riverside statistical area or any successor index, to reflect changes in such index during the twelve months which ended on March 31 preceding each such fiscal year.

(c) Notwithstanding any other provisions herein except Section 3.44.080, if in any fiscal year there is any outstanding financing issued on reliance on the revenue of this special tax, the annual special tax levy shall not decrease below the amount necessary for payment of that outstanding financing and interest thereon.

3.44.080 Annual Report.

The Director of Management Services shall file a report with the City Council no later than January 1, 2006, and at least once a year thereafter. The annual report shall contain both of the following:

- (a) The amount of funds collected and expended.
- (b) The status of any expenditure required or authorized to be funded.

3.44.090 Term.

The annual special tax provided for herein shall be levied in each of twenty-five (25) consecutive fiscal years, commencing with the first fiscal year in which there is a levy pursuant to this chapter.

3.44.100 Adjustments and refunds.

(a) Requests for adjustments involving imposition of this special tax shall be filed with the Director of Management Services. Upon applicant's production of reasonably sufficient evidence of error in the computation of the tax or exemption therefrom, the Director of Management Services or his/her designee shall cause the tax to be recalculated; and shall so advise the Los Angeles County tax collector or other appropriate official.

(b) Whenever it is alleged that the amount of any tax has been overpaid or paid more than once or has been erroneously or illegally collected or received by the city under this chapter, the refund procedure shall be as follows:

(1) No claim for refund of tax payment shall be allowed in whole or in part unless filed with the city clerk within a period of one year from the date of the claimed overpayment. All such claims for refund of the amount of the overpayment must be filed on forms furnished, and in the manner prescribed by the finance department of the city. Refunds may be made solely from the special tax revenues collected under this chapter.

(2) In the event the Director of Management Services denies this claim, he/she shall notify the claimant pursuant to Government Code section 913.

(c) The Director of Management Services shall have the power to settle claims involving the special tax, and the power to accept and record underpayments or overpayments of such tax. The Director of Management Services shall have the authority to make refunds of this tax.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE OF MEASURE V (Continued)

(d) If the County of Los Angeles does not collect any tax due under this chapter, then the Director of Management Services shall have the power and duty to enforce all of the provisions of this chapter. In such cases, an assessment may be made against the owner of a parcel in the manner provided by law. Any unpaid tax due under this chapter shall be subject to all remedies provided under the Municipal Code and as provided by law.

(e) The special tax shall be due in two equal installments in accordance with collection procedures of the Los Angeles County tax collector, with the first installment due November 1st and the second installment due in the next succeeding February 1st, in each fiscal year. The owner of land, at the time set forth in California Revenue and Taxation Code section 405 and 2192 for each fiscal year shall have a personal obligation to the City until the tax is paid for such fiscal year.

(f) The Director of Management Services may prepare a questionnaire to be served on the owner of a parcel subject to this special tax. The questionnaire may request information which would be useful to the Director of Management Services in the enforcement or administration of this chapter. The failure by an owner to provide the information requested within thirty days of receipt of the request, or the act of an owner knowingly providing false information, shall be a misdemeanor.

3.44.110 Amendments.

Procedural provisions of this chapter may be amended by ordinance duly enacted by the City Council.

3.44.120 Severability.

If any section, subsection, part, clause, sentence, or phrase of this chapter or the application thereof is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, the validity of the remaining portions of this chapter, the application thereof, and the tax imposed shall not be affected thereby but shall remain in full force and effect, it being the intention of the City Council and the voters to adopt each and every section, subsection, part, clause, sentence, or phrase regardless or whether any other section, subsection, part, clause, sentence, or phrase or the application thereof is held to be invalid or unconstitutional.

3.44.130 Effective date.

The ordinance enacting this chapter as a part of the Monterey Park Municipal Code and levying the special tax described herein shall be effective ten days after the date on which the City Council has declared the voters of the City of Monterey Park have approved said ordinance by the electors voting on the special tax proposal set forth in said ordinance.

Important tips to stay alive:

- It is recommended that you sleep with your bedroom door closed and install an additional smoke detector inside all bedrooms.
- When you hear the smoke alarm, drop to the floor to get the available fresh air. Try to crawl to a safe exit.
- Before opening a door, feel it first, if it is hot, **DON'T OPEN IT!** Keep the door closed and use another exit such as a window.
- Security bars on windows can make a house a death trap. An emergency release must be provided on the inside of bedroom windows.
- If trapped in a room, keep the door closed, stay low to the floor, and wait by a window. Don't hide under beds or in closets, seal the bottom of the door with blankets or clothing to keep smoke out.

EARTHQUAKE

If you're like most people, after every California earthquake you tell yourself, "I'm going to get prepared for the next one."

Then you don't do a thing about it.

Well, now you can do something about it. Just by reading this page, doing what it says and saving it.

Many earthquake experts in Southern California recommend the following tips to minimize damage in the event of an earthquake.

1. Put together a kit of basic emergency supplies. Include a portable radio, extra batteries, a first aid kit and handbook, wrenches to turn off gas and water valves, and food, water and medication for every member of your family for at least one week.
2. Secure your hot water heater. If your hot water heater falls over during an earthquake, the gas line can rupture and create sparks which can lead to a fire or explosion.
3. Know where your gas, electric and water main shutoffs are and how to shut them off.
4. Secure your tall and heavy furniture. Bookcases, entertainment centers and china cabinets can easily fall over during an earthquake.
5. Put some extra nails in heavy objects that are off the floor such as shelves, mirrors and large picture frames.
6. Hunt for hazard areas in your home. Teach your children to stay away from windows, mirrors and tall furniture.
7. Search for safe places in your home. Show your children how to take cover under a table, desk, or against inside walls.
8. Have a plan to reunite your family after an earthquake. Travel may be difficult and phone lines may be down, so don't drive or call anyone unless it's a real emergency.
9. Check for injury or damage after the shaking stops.
10. Above all, do not panic.

Practicing earthquake drills with your entire family and being prepared with the above instructions will put you in a safer position during any ground motion.

Stop rumbling about how you're going to get ready for "the next one." Prepare for it today. The County of Los Angeles has an Earthquake Survival Program (ESP) with easy monthly preparedness steps.



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HELP AMERICA VOTE ACT (HAVA)

A new federal law, the Help America Vote Act (HAVA), was signed into law in October 2002. It is intended to prevent problems that occurred at the November 2000 presidential election. It provides for the following:

- the modernization of voting systems;
- voter education;
- election official and pollworker training;
- accessibility to voting systems by individuals with disabilities including blind voters;
- a voter complaint procedure;
- provisional balloting for voters whose names are not listed on precinct rosters;
- a statewide voter registration database; and
- numerous other changes.

Additionally, first-time voters who register to vote by mail must prove their identity by either mailing in a copy of their identification when registering to vote or by showing identification when voting.

The City Clerk, shall enter on the records of the City Council of the City, a statement of the result of the election, showing; (1) The whole number of ballots cast in the City; (2) The measure voted upon; (3) The number of votes given for and against the measure (4) The total number of votes given for or against the measure.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and enter it into the book of original resolutions.
